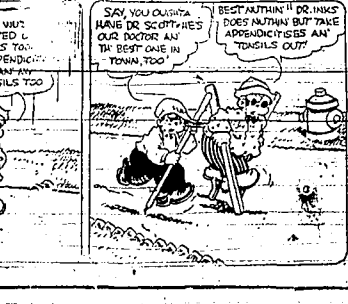

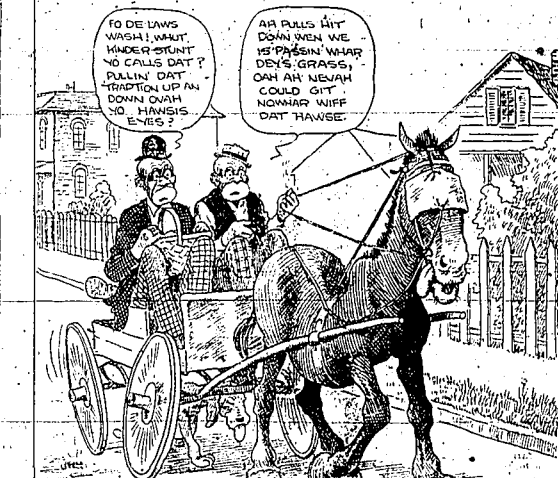

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Henry Lawson says that the republicans are willing for the democrats to be second in the Idaho race. So we have been informed before. That, of course, is very nice of the republicans. They were anxious for the progressives to be second in the race two years ago and actually used their machinery to put them there. This year the democrats who are admittedly gaining ground are not going to stop at second place but will go over the top.

With an evident view of neutralizing the effect of the progressive platform with reference to courts, the progressive party press is quaffing a letter from Louis Brandeis, now Justice of the supreme court of the United States, pag a high tribute to Senator Robert M. La Follette. The date of the letter is not given, but since it places the population of the United States at 90,000,000 it is fair to presume it was written some time between 1910 and which time the population was about 90,000,000 and December 31, 1915, at which time the official estimate was 101,577,000.

The fact that the big end of the bean crop is already saved is a welcome word to give the people of the Twin Falls tract. This is only a small portion of the beanraising territory of the United States but there is none better in proportion to size. The figures furnished in the Times Thursday by H. T. Blake, indicate that the Times' estimate of the day before of the net balance of imports of beans to the country, constitute but two-thirds of the crop of this tract was very conservative. It shows how small the imports for the country as a whole are, and also the relative magnitude of the crop on the Twin Falls tract.

It is hard to reconcile the various views of republican leaders on irrigation or even in their interpretation of the positions of Coolidge and Daves. Daves paints a picture of over-production and makes it clear that he is against further new development. Coolidge talks for further development. Gooding says that he favors the position which he claims both occupy together, namely, the stand against launching new irrigation projects. But Secretary Hubert Work, of the interior department in his Denver address, September 19, said that Coolidge does favor new projects. "The fact-finders Commission (said) recommended the construction of six new projects and extensions of old projects. President Coolidge approved appropriations through the budget bureau for these proposed new projects." Which makes it mighty hard to get an intelligible understanding of what any of them really do want.
