LaFollette Pledges

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Oct. 13.—Robert M. LaFollette launched his campaign crusade in the farmer's west with a prediction that the new crop growers that the present flying prices will not mean their salvation. He promised permanent constructive and progressive legislation if elected.

LaFollette arrived here this morning.

Taking cognizance of the recent price declines of farm products—which have caused the western republicans to claim additional votes for President Coolidge, independent presidential candidates.

"Republican and democratic optimists about these states is Illinois. My information is that the farmer's vote added to the rural farm products has been of little benefit to the farmer.

"Farmers who held their farms' mortgages have suffered greatly. The increase in prices has not done more than pay the interest," he said.

"The farmer's burden carrying the burden of debt which they incurred during the last four years." They must, he forecasted, "be treated differently from the urbanites who have been the chief supporters of the Harding-Coolidge administration."

The Idaho Falls Post says: "Judge Alfred Budge, candidate for re-election to the supreme bench introduced Senator Borah." This indicates the difference regarding judicial ethics between democrats and republicans in this state. The American Bar association has denounced participation of judges in politics "as unethical." Democratic judges have refrained from participation thereof, though the Davis administration pushed the judiciary back into the political arena.

A lot of senators and the plaudits of the same press signed what was known as "A second declaration of independence," which meant independence from the restraints of an ancient document known as "The Constitution of the United States." But now that show is on the other foot, and the president who is "an inside looking out" has a different idea of the perspective from that of the same gentleman "on the outside looking in" four years ago.

## NO REHEARING YET ON RATES

Argued on the demurser in the injunction case brought by the Idaho Power company against the public utilities commission was heard by Judge F. S. Dietrich in the federal court on Friday. The attorneys were given time to file briefs; after which the court will give final consideration to the arguments presented. He will then either sustain the demurser and throw out the case, or will overrule it and have a hearing on the facts. Whatever happens there will be no final decision on the real issue before election. In the meantime, a petition for rehearing on present rates has been hanging fire before the commission since March, and nothing can be done to relieve the people until after election. Of course, it is possible that there will be a rehearing granted and the date set too late to show facts sustaining the reason for lower rates before the people vote in November. In this last case, the profound legal defender of popular rights who now draws a salary as attorney general will be in the limelight as the man who got the rehearing, although the only real efforts made in that direction were by the Southern Idaho Light & Power users' association, practically without the assistance of Mr. Conner. ## WHO WILL BE GOVERNOR IN IDAHO?

Ray McKaig and not H. E. Samuels would be governor of Idaho in the event the latter should be elected chief executive. Dow Dunning, one-time nominee of the third party for congress from the second district, said Saturday. Mr. Dunning announced he could not swallow the progressive party machine, owned and dominated by McKaig, and for that reason would support A. J. Freehafer and the entire democratic state ticket.

Asked what he thought of Mr. Samuels, the progressive nominee, Mr. Dunning said he thought the gubernatorial aspirant was under the thumb of McKaig and willing to let the latter have full sway of the columns of the Samuels newspapers to discredit those whom he could not control.

Dunning was bitter in his denunciation of the "lot of rotten politicians" associated with McKaig in the handling of the third party's affairs in this state. "McKaig is bad," Dunning said, "and his manager does a twin's blushing with shame, even in his basest days."

When questioned as to why he was supporting Freehafer, Mr. Dunning explained that the democratic nominee was always in favor of progressive legislation, had been one of the first men to advocate a direct primary law, and was largely responsible for the initiative and referendum.

Dunning said he admired the stand taken by Mr. Freehafer while a member of the Idaho public utilities commission, but was in favor of that commission only until such time as the government should take over ownership of public utilities.

He also declared that not only himself, but other progressives, would be active in bringing about the defeat of Samuels and his "McKaig-controlled machine," Idaho Statesman.
