The Christian Endeavor is among all to vote, put the blame for bad government as it belongs. As Frank Martin said in his address here, a democracy ruled by a minority of the vicious is the worst form of government...

Twin Falls is a great convention city, the greatest in the state. One great state and another great interstate religious meeting was held here last week, and others are coming. In addition to the attractions in and around the city, the hospitality of the people, functioning through an efficient chamber of commerce is responsible.

More and more the crop results are shown to be satisfactory. There will be plenty of money and lots of prosperity, since coming events cast their shadows before, and the assurance of completion of the road to Contact this winter and to Wells next summer mean much.

The record of the present set of democratic county officials, is sufficient guarantee for the kind of government that we can expect from the election of those seeking return. The democratic members of both legislative houses have a record of which anyone might be proud. The sheriff's office, while quiet in its operation and modest in its claims, has made good, and the commissioners have been efficient and economical. The whole ticket averages high.

Some republican workers are said to be telling their party members that if they search their ballots they may lose their votes. This is nonsense. They have a right to urge them to vote straight if they want to, since it is the privilege of any citizen to use any argument which he believes to be legitimate. But "throwing disarray into" first voters by raising a hubbub about the difficulty of scratching ballot is a form of intimidation. It is "as easy as falling off a log." It has been said that few "democrats" search their tickets to our republic. This is certainly an exaggeration, but nevertheless, the republicans line their membership up much more closely than the democrats do.

ANOTHER "SCANDAL"

Crying out to the world with that weird wail which particularly distinguishes a politician who, reading the handwriting on the wall, attempts to explain away the certain defeat of his candidate, Chairman Butler of the republican organization, yesterday accused the democratic and independent members of an open alliance to "keep Coolidge out of the White House."

It is a terrible catastrophe if one must believe Butler. Worse than that, it is a dastardly attempt on the part of John W. Davis and Robert M. La Follette to defeat the will of the people, and as Butler puts it, deprive the voters of their right to elect a president at the polls.

According to Butler's reckoning, neither Davis nor La Follette have any desire to become president of the United States. There's not the worthy ambition to become the chief executive of this nation; it is rather an "unholy alliance" to keep Coolidge from being it. Of course Butler is worried. And why shouldn't he be.

Daily the strength of the stalwart democratic candidate is becoming greater in those pivotal states where the gauge of battle has been thrown down. Daily, republicans of note, disgusted with such assuming machinations of the director of their campaign, are shifting over to the side of Davis.

American citizens of any intelligence whatever can hardly fail to see through the humbug as expounded by Butler and passed on as a dire deed equal to the Tenopel Dome scandal by the mouthpiece of the organization.

Its appeal for silly argument has never before been encountered in a presidential campaign. One has only to turn back to 1912 to see the fallacy of such an argument that two opposing political organizations had entered into a plot to defeat a third party.

In 1912 the democrats and progressives, it will be remembered, engaged in what Butler would have called an open alliance. The democrats won and great was the rejoicing in the ranks of Theodore Roosevelt when the results were announced.

The argument made yesterday by Butler of a plot between Davis and La Follette is as absurd today as it would have been in 1912 when the same condition held good.

That the election may be thrown into congress because of the fact that there are three candidates in the field is true, but to say if such an extraordinary state of affairs did occur, the people would lose their rights, is bunk.

There is a remedy, however. It is simply this. Vote for Davis.

A vote for Coolidge would, with little doubt, throw the election into congress, that place so greatly feared by Butler. And a vote for La Follette, even though cast with all earnestness would be thrown away.—Nevada State Journal

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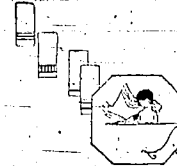
