The latest cases are believed to be members of the families of the first victims who attended the funeral.

Whether or not additional deaths have occurred since the three burials this morning could not be learned.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Nov. 1.—The pneumonic plague has developed in this city.


Twelve Mexicans have fallen victim to the plague during the past few days while at least five others are expected to die.

Dan Connor's Record in Office

DAN, HOW DO YOU GET THAT WAY?

This reminds us of two Irishmen walking from New York to Chicago. On nearing their destination, they passed through a marsh full of bull frogs one evening. Having never heard them before, they sneaked up nearer to the noise to find out what it was. After careful investigation, Pat said, "Aw Mike, it's nothing but a noise."

Dan invites comparison for the whole board's record. A right, here goes. Dan says: That they cut tax valuations \$1,417,529.82. Where do you get that noise? Our assessor, Claude Stewart, is solely to be credited for this, the commissioners had nothing whatever to do with it.

Dan says: That they refused a raise in salary of \$600.00 each per year. You never had it offered to you. The facts are that you commissioners tried to have Twin Falls county changed back to a first class county, thereby getting an increase in salary; but you were refused this by the legislature.

Dan says: That further savings were effected by not furnishing autos to county officials. Court House records show that the present board's auto hire has increased 148 per cent over the preceding board. Is that a saving? Dan, do you know where the commissioners went? and who went with them? Two and one-half times as much traveling done the last two years as former years.

Dan also says: That the board saved the county \$28,911.00. The expense accounts do not show it. The only department for which you can claim credit for economy is your own. It cost you \$600.00 more to run your own office this year than it did last year. You have spent \$3,889.11 more to run the county this year than you spent last year. If the people elect men to offices, who conduct their respective offices in a businesslike manner so as to affect savings in their department, why should the commissioners claim the credit?

Dan, after careful investigation, we found that it is "nothing but a noise." Dan says: That the commissioners saved \$1600.10 in the care of the poor. How did you do it? Why did you pay \$2.20 per ton more for a very inferior grade of coal for the poor than was offered you? You could have "effected" a greater saving in this, maybe.

# Expenses of State Go Up High and Come Down Slowly Under the G.O.P.

Figures given in the accompanying table, taken from the official records at the state house, says the Idaho Call, will give the citizens of Idaho a clear idea of the cost of their government at the capital in Boise in the past 32 years. Bear in mind that this is the cost of the state government alone and does not include the cost of counties, municipalities, school and other districts.

NOTE: The table for the present administration is incomplete and the estimate is that the figures will show a reduction of between three and four million dollars. Final victory for the tenants of mutual power was announced in the receipt of word from the supreme court in the case of Mary J. Syster against W. C. Hazzard involving the ownership of Clear Lakes power, whereas motion for rehearing is denied in a ruling handed down by Chief Justice Alfred Burdick and received by Judge James H. Rothwell representing Hazzard. This closes the matter in the supreme court.

Mrs. Syster, who owns surrounding land contested the claims of Hazzard some years ago. In recent litigation it has practically become a contest between Hazzard and the Idaho Power company as the latter admitted interest in Mrs. Syster's contention, and also was represented by attorneys of the power company.

This would appear to be the removal of the last obstacle in the way of the plan to supply mutual power to both the north and south side.
