DREAD PLAGUE IN CITY OF LOS ANGELES

Grave Pneumonic Plague
Breaks Out in Southern

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 1.—Twelve more cases of the dread plague declared by city health officials to be the pneumonic plague were reported today.

The new outbreaks are in the Mexican district where the disease has already claimed a dozen lives during the past few days, the first fatalities being among the mourners at the funeral of Mrs. Luciana Samarra, who died of the disease.

The latest cases are believed to be members of the families or friends of those who attended the Samarra funeral.

Whether or not additional deaths have occurred since the three occurring this morning could not be learned.

DAN, HOW DO YOU GET THAT WAY?

This reminds us of two Irishmen walking from New York to Chicago. On nearing their destination, they passed through a marsh full of bull frogs one evening. Having never heard them before, they sneaked up nearer to the noise to find out what it was. After careful investigation, Pat said, "Aw Mike, it's nothing but a noise."

Dan invites comparison for the whole board's record. "Alright, here goes. Dan says: That they cut tax valuations \$1,417,528.82. Where do you get that noise? Our assessor, Claude Stewart, is solely to be credited for this, the commissioners had nothing whatever to do with it.

Dan says: That they refused a raise in salary of \$600.00 each per year. You never had it offered to you. The facts are that our commissioners tried to have Twin Falls county changed back to a first class county, thereby getting an increase in salary; but you were refused this by the legislature.

Dan says: That further savings were effected by not furnishing autos to county officials. Court House records show that the present board's auto hire has increased 148 per cent over the preceding board. Is that a saving? Dan, do you know where the commissioners went? and who went with them? Two and one-half times as much traveling done the last two years as former years.

Dan also says: That the board saved the county \$28,911.00. The expense accounts don't show it. The only department for which you can claim credit for economy is your own. It cost you \$600.00 more to run your own office this year than it did last year. You have spent \$3,889.11 more to run the county this year than you spent last year. If the people elect men to offices, who conduct their respective offices in a businesslike manner so as to affect savings in their department, why should the commissioners claim the credit?

Dan, after careful investigation, we found that it is "nothing but a noise." Dan says: That the commissioners saved \$1600.10 in the care of the poor. How did you do it? Why did you pay \$2.20 per ton more for a very inferior grade of coal for the poor than offered you? You could have "effected" a greater saving in this, maybe.

This was the result of a misunderstanding of oral instructions transmitted through several channels.

REPUBLICANS TRY TO GET 'EM A-COMIN' AN' A-GWINE

It is probably nearly impossible to be wholly consistent in running a campaign, but one republican friends do the limit. We read their editorials urging-bulky to voters to vote for the ward has been passing down the line to party workers to say to republican voters, "Let the chickens do the scratching," and yet every republican worker and every republican candidate is trying to get democrats to scratch their tickets. Talking to democrats to refuse to halt the whole ticket, it is pointed that there is no danger of any democrat losing a vote by scratching the ticket to vote for one or more republicans. On the other hand, republicans are sometimes warned by workers, it is said, that if they try to scratch a ballot they may mark it wrong, invalidate it and so lose a vote. No conscious reflection on the intelligence of the average republican is intended by the workers of the party in this implied compliment to the superior acumen of the followers of Jefferson. The fact is that comparatively speaking democrats do scratch more than republicans and when a general advice to vote a straight ticket is given by the republicans it is assumed by the experienced republican politician that he can line up his own men, and democrats will still vote as they please. The general intelligence of the personnel of all parties is the same, but republicans are more amenable to party discipline than democrats. If the republican advice to vote the ticket straight were followed in this country, for instance, the republicans would suffer, for the democrats carried it two years ago, and the third party had over 1500 votes, so that the republicans would be in a minority of 2100 should those outside their fold take the advice liberally. If the argument is that the party whose officials have made good should fill all the county offices, surely, it would tell for democracy, for those in office here during the past two years have been good and faithful servants. But, after all, voting a straight or a scratched ticket, is a matter for the individual voter. What the voter should not east is a "crooked" ticket. Vote only for country.
