## PLAQUE TOLL IN CALIFORNIA PLACED AT 23

One More Victim Reported;  
Five of Those Who Died  
Yesterday Were Mexi-  
cans; One Family Is Hard  
Hit by Malady.

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 3.—One death  
during the night brought the plague  
victims in the present epidemic  
to 23, making 28 total. In the Mexican  
section of the city to 23, according to  
the best figures available today. Seven  
persons are in the hospital, sickens-  
en with the disease, and additional  
deaths are expected. The new and  
worst day during Sunday.

Of yesterday's victims five were  
Mexicans. One was Father M. Brazil-  
lin, pastor of the Plaza Catholic  
church who is believed to have been  
come exposed to the plague while  
administering alms to the church to  
a dying parishioner.

Another of the latest to succumb  
was Emmett McLaughlin, ambulance  
driver, who is supposed to have been  
exposed while transporting a patient  
to the Red Cross hospital.

Despite the fact that the death toll  
includes more than the official 17,  
who contracted the disease while at-  
tending the funeral service of Mrs.  
MacDonald, died on October 19, city  
and state health department authori-  
ties are optimistic.

A rigid quarantine has been thrown  
about the stricken section, which in-  
cludes the territory between Alameda  
street and the 12th street, and from  
from Main to Alhambra road.

The guard of 25 men will be doubled  
today with guards carrying saw-  
ed-off shotguns. A silence of a mile  
of a mile is maintained in the streets.

Every house where the disease has  
appeared has a guard in front of it,  
while streets entering the "contact  
area" are closed.

The General Hospital, where the  
plague has broken out, has been ho-  
lis by his disease. Sanitarium

died on October 17. One week fol-  
lowing her funeral her husband died.  
A few days later his mother suc-  
cumbed, and yesterday a brother and  
sister died.

Detailed information on the extent  
of the disease is hard to obtain.

A shipment of serum is reported  
on route from Indianapolis by air-  
plane, supplementing a small quantity  
of serum which was sent by rail.

The Holt of the state board of  
health is in the city, aiding Dr. Elmer  
R. Pascoe, acting city health  
officer in conducting the investigation.

A break in violent pneumo-

nia has been reported.

"It is serious, but the state board  
has every hope of controlling it to its  
present peak," said Dr. Pascoe.

Health and health care is impor-

tant. Properly handled, the out-  
break can be quickly stamped out.

One of the necessary measure to be  
done is prompt eradication of the

dead.

The present board of commissioners invites comparison with any other public body in the state of Idaho for efficiency and economy.

It cut valuations from \$29,164,997.99 in 1922 to \$27,747,174.14 in 1923, a reduction of \$1,417,523.82.

On this lower valuation it reduced the levy half a mill, making a saving of about \$14,000, and by a program of economy and retrenchment made another saving of nearly \$15,000 as is shown by the following items:

These figures do not take into account a similar saving for the year 1924, and remember—another reduction of tax levy amounting to one-half mill was made this year.

Further savings have been effected by the custom inaugurated by the present board of commissioners of not furnishing automobiles to county officials, with the exception of the sheriff's office. By separating the business department from the professional department at the county hospital a further saving will be effected with better care and service.

This board took the initiative in having passed the "Lazy Husband" law which has been most successful and of great benefit.

The system of requiring county officials to requisition the board for supplies makes for more business-like procedure and economy and a complete invoice of the county property aided greatly in this regard.

# PIKE REFUTES ATTACKS UPON COUNTY BOARD

**Twin Falls Senator Says Commissioners in Original Resolution Specifically Waived All Right to Increased Salary Should County Be Re-Classified; Acted on Advice of Lawyers; Black and Conner Reversed Themselves on Necessity.**

The Twin Falls commissioners in their statements about and investigations against the county commissioners relative to the bill which I introduced to change Twin Falls from a county to a city, said in their original resolution, "said Mr. W. F. Pike, present state senator today, when interviewed by a reporter of the Times, "The commissioners were not in a position to act on the bill, and any resolution to make a change in the law was necessary in order to pay certain bills monthly that could not otherwise be paid and saying that they had legal advice on the subject, but that they had been advised that they should members themselves not to accept any extra salary on account of the change should the bill pass."

"I found it necessary to have my own lawyers who I believe are more experienced in such cases, because before necessary, in order to pay the resulting bills and it would get the results desired and he answered affidavit to the effect that the commissioners were not in a position to act on the bill, and that attorney general was very emphatic in the matter and so we several other senators attorneys I then introduced a resolution to which a senator on a committee to which it was referred said it was unnecessary. On further consideration the attorney general reversed his first opinion. I told Black that Conner, Harkness, and myself were in agreement that the bill was necessary, and that he was mistaken at first, and that the change was not required. I dropped the matter, then the commissioners at all times believed the commissioners did not accept any extra salary."
