## PLAGUE TOLL IN CALIFORNIA PLACED AT 23

One More Victim Reported;  
Five of Those Who Died  
Yesterday Were Mexi-  
cans; One Family Is Hard  
Hit by Malady.

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 3.—One death during the night brought the toll of victims in the pneumonic epidemic which has developed in the Mexican section of the city to 23, according to the health officials today. Six persons are in the hospital, sick with the disease and additional deaths are expected. Seven men and women died during Sunday.

Of yesterday's victims five were Mexicans. One was Father M. Bruals, pastor of the Plaza Catholic church, who is believed to have become exposed to the plague while administering rites of the church to a dying patient.

Another of the latest victims was Ernest McLaughlin, ambulance driver, who is supposed to have been exposed while transporting a patient to the general hospital.

Despite the fact that the death toll includes more than the district attending the funeral service of Mrs. Luciana Benararo on October 19, city and state health department authorities are optimistic.

A rigid quarantine has been thrown about the stricken section which includes the territory between Alameda and Main streets to Alhambra road.

The guard of 25 men will be doubled today with machine carrying rifles. A number of Mexicans to break through the quarantine line.

Every house where the disease has appeared has a guard in front of it, while streets entering the "contact" area are closed.

The Benararo family, where the plague first broke out, has been quarantined by the district. Mrs. Benararo died on October 17. One week following her funeral her husband died. Two days later his mother succumbed and yesterday a brother and sister died.

Despite information on the extent of the epidemic is hard to obtain. A shipment of serum is expected en route from Indianapolis by air-plane, supplementing a small quantity on hand, which was soon exhausted.

Dr. Holliday of the state board of health is in the city, aiding Dr. Ely, who is trying to control the epidemic in combatting the disease.

The outbreak of violent pneumonia calls for no hysterical part of the people of Los Angeles, stated Dr. Ely, president of the state board of health in a message from his San Francisco office today.

He stressed that the state board has every hope of confining it to its present area. Co-operation between the public and health board is imperative. Properly handled, the outbreak can be quickly stamped out.

One of the necessary measures to be taken promptly is eradication of rodents.

## Take Measures for Curbing of Grave Sickness

WASHINGTON, Nov. 3.—Serum laboratories in New York today were called on by the United States public health service to report at once if they were able to supply antitoxins with which to fight the pneumonic plague in Los Angeles.

If the New York manufacturers have none on hand, the Pasteur Institute at Paris, France, the only other place in the world where the serum is available, will be asked to ship some to this country.

## BRITISH CABINET TO BE SELECTED

Former Virginia Beauty  
May Gain Membership  
in New Body.

LONDON, Nov. 3.—Lady Nancy Astor, former Virginia beauty, may be included in the cabinet which Stanley Baldwin prepared today in anticipation of an invitation sometime tomorrow to form a new administration.

Strong political influences are at work to either have the American-born beauty, who was elected to parliament at Plymouth for the fourth time, or the Marquis of Athol, a successful Scottish candidate, in the next ministry. Lady Astor has had the greater political experience.

It was confirmed today that Stanley MacDonald will present the resignation of his government tomorrow.

He will make a speech in the House of Commons on October 19, in which he will announce his resignation.

Advocates of inclusion of Lady Astor in the cabinet point to the fact that labor lord Margaret Bondfield in his cabinet was a considerable factor in the conservative handling of the 1923 election.

Lord Bondfield, who was elected to the cabinet after the death of the Marquis of Athol, was a member of the cabinet until the death of the Marquis of Athol.

"Mrs. Harding's condition remains much the same as last week. She has developed a number of symptoms that were present in her condition last year, but her condition now is rather severe."

Dr. Sawyer, widow of President Harding's physician, is in constant attendance of Mrs. Harding.

Charles W. Davis, for the democrats, claimed 150 electoral votes.

La Follette, for the independents, claimed 50 electoral votes.

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## Boise Attorney Endorses Freehafer for Governor

Boise, Idaho, Nov. 3, 1924.  
Dear Friend: I write you as one interested in having, if possible, a man in the governor's chair of this state who is definitely and aggressively Christian, and trust that it may not seem inappropriate for me to mention the merits of a personal friend.

You may know that for more than 20 years I have been quite active in the movements for moral and temperance reform in this state. During that time there has probably been no one more definitely and actively interested in these movements than Hon. A. L. Freehafer, who is a candidate for governor at the approaching election.

The Christian people are entitled to know before preparing their ballot that Mr. Freehafer served in the legislature during practically all the years when local option, prohibition and law enforcement were burning state issues, as a member of the legislature he was one of the most outspoken and staunch advocates of local option before public sentiment made it possible to enact it. During the session at which the local option was enacted he was active in its behalf, and later helped very materially in the enactment of the several laws for its enforcement and finally assisted in drafting and passing the state-wide prohibitory law and the constitutional amendment. As attorney for the Anti-Saloon League at that time I was closely associated with him as he was a member of the executive committee of the state league.

During the 22 years that he has resided in this state he has served as a Sunday school superintendent for fully 20 years, first at Council, where he then resided, and later as superintendent of one of the largest schools in Boise where he resided for five or six years and he is now superintendent of the M. E. Sunday school at Fayetteville. He has not only been active in every line of church work but has also been a friend and supporter of the Y. M. C. A. and the Boy Scout movement, as a man of the highest Christian ideals, his character has run true to principle.

I would not disparage in any way either of the opposing candidates, both of whom are able and gentlemen, but it is so infrequent that a man of very active Christian standing becomes a candidate for a high political office and I feel that the Christian people should be fully informed when there is the opportunity of voting for this type of man.

If you feel that Mr. Freehafer's candidacy merits your support I am sure you will be glad to pass these facts along to others who may not be advised.

The car had gone its way two days before Mr. Hall reported the accident, and yet Mr. E. E. Hall demanded that we arrest somebody at once, though he failed and neglected to appear before a magistrate and file a complaint which would have been necessary before an arrest in this case could be made.

## RECORD IN OFFICE

The present board of commissioners invites comparison with any other public body in the state of Idaho for efficiency and economy.

It cut valuations from \$29,164,997.99 in 1922 to \$27,747,474.14 in 1923, a reduction of \$1,417,523.82.

On this lower valuation it reduced the levy half a mill, making a saving of about \$14,000, and by a program of economy and retrenchment made another saving of nearly \$16,000 as is shown by the following items:

These figures do not take into account a similar saving for the year 1924, and remember—another reduction of tax levy amounting to one-half mill was made this year.

Further savings have been effected by the custom inaugurated by the present board of commissioners of not furnishing automobiles to county officials, with the exception of the sheriff's office. By separating the business department from the professional department at the county hospital a further saving will be effected with better care and service.

This board took the initiative in having passed the "Lazy Husband" law which has been most successful and of great benefit.

The system of requiring county officials to requisition the board for supplies makes for more business-like procedure and economy, and a complete invoice of the county property aided greatly in this regard.

# PIKE REEFITES ATTACKS UPON COUNTY BOARD

Twin Falls Senator Says Commissioners in Original Resolution Specifically Waived All Right to Increased Salary Should County Be Re-Classified; Acted on Advice of Lawyers; Black and Conner Reversed Their selves on Necessity.

The Twin Falls News and Daily Review were both wrong Saturday in their statements about and insinuations against the county commissioners relative to the bill which introduced to change Twin Falls from a second class to a first class county," said Mr. W. P. Pike, present senator today, when interviewed by a reporter of the Times. "The commissioners went to me a copy of a bill, and a resolution to the effect that change in the law was necessary in order to pay certain bills monthly that could not otherwise be paid, and saying that they had had legal advice on the matter. The resolution stated that the commissioners had waived their right to a salary increase on account of the change in the law. I asked Attorney General A. H. Connor if he considered the law was right about such assurance being necessary, in order to pay the bills, and he said it was not. I then said that the bill was not necessary and was rejected. The commissioners then introduced the bill, after which a senator on a committee to which it was referred said it was not necessary. On further consideration the attorney general reversed his first opinion. I told Black that Connor had changed his mind and Black said, 'Well, he and I differ.' Later, after further consideration, Black said, 'I am not a senator at first, and that the matter then was not required. I dropped the matter then. The commissioners at all times believed themselves not to accept any raise in salary.'

## Provo Friends Are Predicting Election of Editor of Times

Friends of L. H. Masters, former publisher of the Provo Herald and now publisher of the Twin Falls Times, at Twin Falls, Idaho, are anxiously following the campaign in Idaho and will be greatly interested in the election from that state on the contest for lieutenant governor, says the Provo (Utah) Sentinel-Herald. When the democratic state convention convened in Twin Falls last August there was but one name which was not mentioned by the delegates for lieutenant governor and Mr. Masters was nominated without opposition.
