# GIBBONS AND KID NORFOLK ARE MATCHED

## Fighters to Meet Night of December 8 in Madison Square Garden; Bout Is Scheduled to Go Fifteen Rounds.

NEW YORK, Nov. 6.—Tom Gibbons, St. Paul boxer, who has been selected the champion since he won fifteen rounds with Jack Dempsey in Shelby last summer, has been matched to meet Kid Norfolk, a colorful, aging fighter, who won in Baltimore, Md., as Willie Ward.

Gibbons and Norfolk will meet in Madison Square Garden on the night of December 8 for the New York Christmas fund. They are to go 15 rounds or ten—and have to make 12 people.

Tex Rickard, who made the match for the committee in charge of the Christmas fund, is trying to get a light heavyweight championship involved.

Mike McFiege, the world's champion, and Gene Tunney, the American "fly" champion, are to meet in Madison Square Garden.

McFiege will not fight any one other than Tunney, and Tunney is extremely cautious in picking his matches. Under the circumstances, the winner of the Gibbons-Norfolk match will be regarded unofficially as the champion, and it is understood that Rickard will offer a bet to the winner.

King Buried in Tea Trunk.

When Henry II was in Wales in 1177 receiving the submission of the Welsh, he ordered to have the death of King Arthur sung by the Welsh and was told the exact burial place of the hero of Glasbury. Some years later the abbot of Glasbury, the king's nephew, searched for the body and found it buried in the trunk of a tree, beside that of Arthur's queen, Guinevere. When Glasbury abbey was made a ruin by Henry VIII's king, the remains of King Arthur and his queen were swept away according to the London tradition. It was on Calvary hill in Somerset, the famous Collyer of Ailmar, reported that the British king prepared for his great stand against the Anglo-Saxons; and the name of Arthur still clings to the locality which has become known by the name of "Arthur's Grave" and "Arthur's Well."

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Free distribution of fifty million trees and shrubs to prairie farmers by the Canadian government during the past few years has proven to be a far-sighted and beneficial public policy. This sort of paternalism accomplishes great good, without giving much opportunity for dishonesty.

Some sections are now witnessing a three-cornered feud between prohibition officers, bootleggers and high-jackers. The high-jacker holds up and robs the bootlegger and the enforcement officers are after both. Several innocent citizens have been shot recently by being mistaken for one or the other. All of them are entirely too handy with their pistols.

Americans have won unprecedented fame this year in international contests requiring supreme endurance, skill and courage. Their great victory in the Olympic games, in tennis, polo and practically every department of outdoor sport have demonstrated American superiority as never before. The crowning glory of their achievements was the successful completion of the flight of Army airmen around the world, which has given their fellow citizens an intense thrill of pride and has won the admiration of all the nations of the earth.

In a recent address Major General C. C. Williams enumerated and described many new and formidable war machines, including improved machine guns, trench mortars, tanks and anti-aircraft guns. He also described aerial bombs six times as destructive as those dropped by Zeppelins during the world war and told of new guns for defense of the Panama Canal which would move on railroad tracks and sweep the sea for 23 miles with 16-inch shells.

### A PROBLEM FOR THE RURAL COMMUNITY

School has begun. Approximately two-thirds of the young people between the ages of 5 and 20 who live in the open country or the small towns and villages have opened in-school. Of this host of over 11,000,000 boys and girls, over 3,000,000 are in one-teacher schools.

The teachers of these 175,000 one-teacher rural schools have received the fewest number of weeks of professional training of any group of teachers. Nearly half of them, no doubt, are teaching with the smallest amount of preparation permitted by the law. Over one-fourth of them are teaching their first term of school. The majority of them are young, three or four years younger than town and village teachers. Moreover, their school terms are one or two months shorter than those of the latter group.

In view of these facts has the State complied with its obligation in public education? Have the rural boys and girls an equality of opportunity in education? Are they provided facilities for obtaining an education which are in any respect equal to those generally provided in larger centers of population?

The above inadequate conditions make imperative the attention and assistance of every local community to its rural school. Parents, as well as school boards and superintendents, should help the teacher by seeing that the necessary books, supplies, and equipment are provided as needed by the children. The teacher's full time should be devoted to the important task of directing the children in their development. Her energy should be concentrated on methods of securing the best possible development of each individual child entrusted to her care.

#### Mythology and History

The mythical stories of Egyptian gods are histories. Take the tale of Osiris, Isis and Horus. The god Osiris was once a great king of Egypt. He was set upon and killed by his brother Seth, who was aided by 72 conspirators. Take the wife of Osiris, Isis, she found her husband's coffin in Egypt and brought it back to Egypt. She then reappeared, took up the body of Osiris, and she ever faithful sought out all the fragments and erected a temple over each of them. Then, setting forces with her, she took two fell upon her and drove him into the Red sea. Plunderer Petrie, the archeologist, asserts that there is proof that this myth explains history from periods long before the invention of writing. The struggle of the gods is a story of the early history of the world, in which the gods are really the wars of their respective warlords.

#### Shemakers' Patron Saint

The patron saint of shoemakers is St. Crispin, who, though of noble family, became a shoemaker, and is said to have advised his fellow workers for the poor. He was venerated at Orleans, France, about 257.

#### Vitality of Coffee in Haiti

The remarkable vitality of the coffee plant is shown in Haiti, where it is used as coffee. It was planted about the French colonies were discovered of their plantations 120 years ago. The natives have merely profited from the rich farm heritage which from their employers and rulers, and helped even themselves with their own hands. The coffee plant has become one of the most valuable products of Haiti commerce. The bulk of the coffee is grown in France. Added to the fact that the coffee plant is a native of the island, the French coffee planter has his plan by tearing off branches with the pods, and thus stimulates productivity.
