In Chicago the aim of the lawyers on both sides is to depict the youthful murderers as of perfectly bad character.

THE TEST OF DEMOCRACY

If ever anyone had any doubt, that the Great War, in Mr. Wilson's classic phrase, was fought to "make the world safe for democracy," the electoral record of the last twelve months ought to dispel that doubt. Before 1914, in Europe at any rate, elections were relatively infrequent, and in many countries had little effect upon government policy. Today elections are being held, or have recently taken place, in all the leading countries of the West and in many lesser states as well. And in Great Britain two elections have been held within a year, an example which may be soon followed both by Germany and Italy. Certainly the war has given democracy its chance to make good.

Yet despite its triumph everywhere, never has the popular enthusiasm for democracy been less. In old days when kings and aristocrats held unchallenged sway popular government seemed to promise the millennium. There is no desire today for a return to the outworn systems of yesterday, but there is much less confidence than there was that the machinery of democracy is the panacea for human ills. People are at odds with their politicians with the constitutions under which they live, with the apparent inability of legislatures or governments to straighten things out to their satisfaction.

None the less, democracy has come to stay. That is not because democracy creates in itself a particularly efficient system of government. It notoriously does not, a every business man will agree. Nor is it mainly because a democratic system makes it impossible for those in high office to ignore the well being of the people and to deflect government for long in the interests of a single class or clique. The fundamental reason is because democracy creates better men and women, by throwing the ultimate responsibility for public policy on the people themselves instead of making it possible for them to shuffle off the responsibility onto others. Democracy is not so much an efficient system of government as the best system of educating responsible citizens which has yet been contrived.

The contrast was well shown in the Great War. Imperial Germany was probably the most efficient government that the world has ever seen. Yet its efficiency was imposed from above, as a result of Bismarck's success. It was not a growth in understanding from below. Despite their prestige, the Germans were politically the most docile, least responsible and least independent of all the great peoples of the earth, the Russians only excepted. In consequence it was possible for a small clique to utilize the gigantic state machine of pre-war Germany for the ends of a policy of their own, practically without any effective internal resistance of the German people themselves. Yet when it came to the issue, despite unpreparedness and improvisation, democracy stood the test of war better than more highly organized autocracy.

Today, except in the case of Russia, and presumably only temporary also of Italy and Spain, the peoples are in control of their governments. Democracy, therefore, is on trial as it has never been on trial before. And the prospects of its success rest, as its name implies, with the people themselves. It is the fashion just now to put all the blame on the politicians. That is sheer hypocrisy. No doubt there are bad politicians. They are bad because they appeal to the ignorance, or cupidity, or self-righteousness of the people. But they succeed because the people follow their flattery and promises, instead of following the less exciting and less tempting lead of those who tell them the truth, that good government spells self-sacrifice and not the distribution of benefits.

Democracy will be a success just in proportion as the thought of the people is governed by public spirit, by wisdom, by brotherly love, and by the active desire to promote honestly the welfare of all mankind. It will be a failure just in proportion as their thought is governed by selfishness, ignorance, or prejudice. No party has the monopoly of virtue. All parties are instantly responsive to any real demand for better things from the electorate. So in the next few weeks the people will be on trial. It is to be hoped they will rise to their opportunity.

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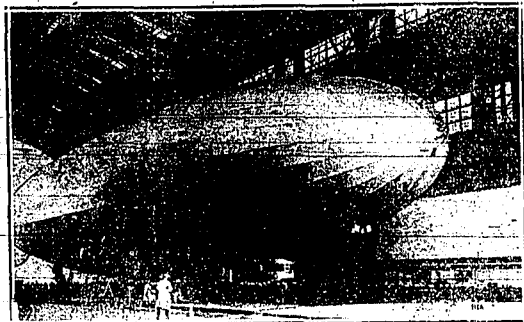

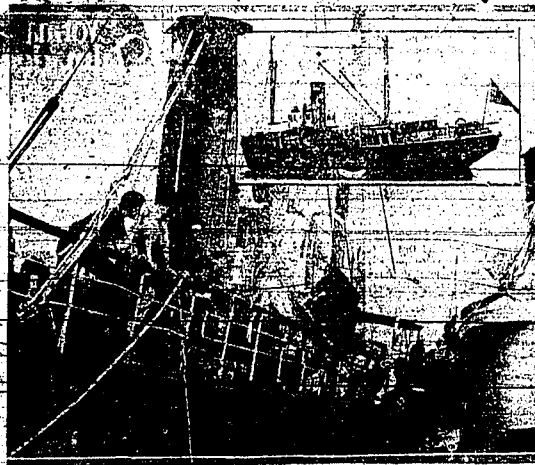
