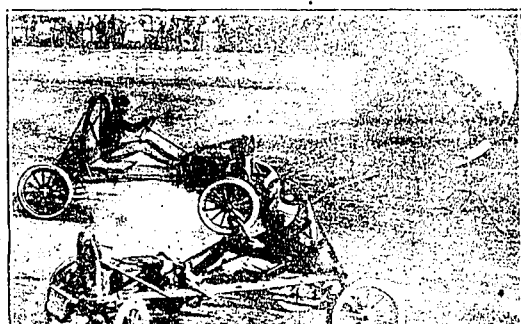

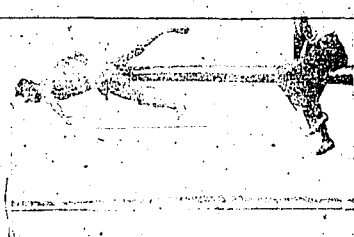

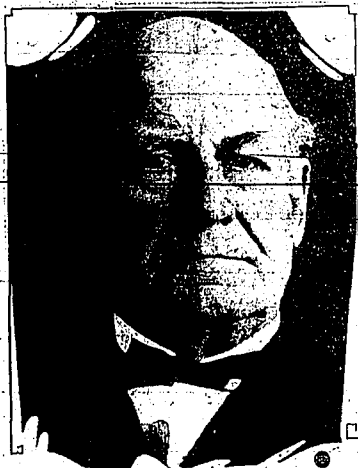

New chemical devices for shredding the amount of the instrument in words into two colors have been developed to a high degree. Safety paper has also been developed to an extent undreamed of a few years ago. Forgery insurance-agencies still further safeguard Business concerning all over the world are taking cognizance of the toll exacted by the forger, and are combining the devices at their disposal in combating commercial fraud. The forger will continue to flourish until every check issued is surrounded with

Woman May Bind Herself by Note Same as Husband

That a woman may execute a valid accommodation mortgage to her husband's property is declared by Judge J. S. Dehler of the U. S. court in dismissing the case of Oren A. Vanderburg, plaintiff, vs. H. J. Hume, et al, wherein an effort was made to set aside a note mortgage on the ground that this is not in which the plaintiff also endeavored to set up the claim of coercion on the part of J. S. Dehler. Judge Dehler says "The evidence presented in this case on the one hand to sustain the charge of coercion, and on the other hand to support defendant's claim to the plaintiff." 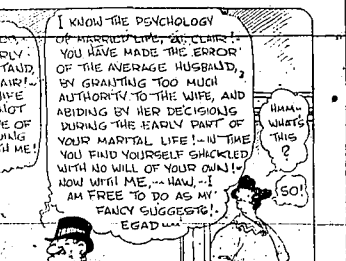
