MINIDOKA BANK ROBBER GIVEN LONG SENTENCE

Albert Engstrom, Twenty-two, Sentenced Today for Daylight Robbery of Minidoka Bank; Others Still at Large.

(Special to The Times)

RUPERT, Nov. 28.—Albert Engstrom, a youth of 22 years, was found guilty early Thursday morning of robbery of the First National Bank of Rupert, November 7, and was given this morning sentence by Judge T. Dally Lee to serve from two to 20 years in the penitentiary. The other two bursars who were connected with the daring crime are still at large.

Engstrom, testifying young Engstrom claimed he acted the afternoon on which the robbery was committed in Rupert and at 2:15 p. m., that it is almost impossible to know what took place.

Engstrom, however, told the court he had been told by witnesses said he was in the pool hall about half an hour, after which he went out on the street, a short time later going to the Palace cafe, where a little after three o'clock he met his co-conspirators and, under a fictitious name, asked for cross-examination.

MUTINY AMONG INDIAN TROOPS CAUSE OF WAR

Egyptian Troops Refuse to Leave Sudan Following Assassination of Leader; British Troops Fire; Several Killed.

CARIO, Nov. 28.—Two Sudanese platoons at Khartoum mutinied today and rushed a British soldier, killing British subjects and two Syrian doctors, according to advisers from Khartoum.

British troops repelled an assault, but suffered heavy casualties.

A critical situation arose on Tuesday with refusal of Egyptian troops to leave the Sudan because the Sultan had been removed by force.

This was the result of a demand of the original British demands sent following the assassination of Sir Lee

Stack.

Another clash at Khartoum followed with a military force of Sudanese troops, led by a platoon which had recently been recruited as an attempted massacre and a clash with British regulars in which many of the black troops were killed, but for a century been a mark of distinction.

There was a demand for a general

strike, but the British had been

preparing for the possibility of a civil war.

NEW VERSION OF BIBLE IS PUBLISHED

Dr. James Moffat of Glasgow Has Modern Translation Suited to 20th Century; Calls Noah's Ark "Barge"

NEW YORK, Nov. 28.—Noah's ark was a "barge," the garden of Eden a "park," the city of David, "David's burg" in the modern translation of the "Talmud," a just man, "a saint," by Dr. James Moffat of Glasgow, Scotland.

The announced purpose of the translation is to reduce the old testament to a language that will be understood by all people.

Dr. Moffat is the author of "The New Testament in the King James Version, couched in the language of 1911, is not clear in 1924. We advise a new version of the Old Testament, a translation of the Hebrew Bible, in the language of 1924."

The latest Moffat work is not the preface states, a revision of the accepted King James' revision of the scriptures, but a "new" translation from the original manuscripts.

He has made a new translation, both exact and idiomatic, intended for the twentieth century, he says. The original translation, Dr. Moffat holds, was made from various sources.

He has added a section, "Notes on the New Testament," another which he has written.

The first volume, as presented by the United States by the George R. Duran company "excels through the beauty of its style."

Dr. Moffat in his preface explains that the Old Testament is to be used, not made, from a collection of books, oriental in form and in thought. They have, he adds, been collected from various sources.

Dr. Moffat has endeavored to make the original Hebrew knowledge.

Dr. Moffat discards the word "Jehovah" and replaces it with "The Eternal," as more properly representative of the name of the ancient Hebrew word to modern thought.

The new translation is dealing with the creation says:

"Then God the eternal moulded man from the dust of the ground, breathing into his nostrils the breath of life: this was how man became a living being."

"In the land of Eden, in the far east, God the eternal then planted

Happy Jack Warns Against Fire Risk of Dirty Chimney

When will the people of Twin Falls be awoken to the need of adequate fire protection? I have asked myself this question frequently during the last days. We have been told to keep open chimneys with an axe. In this city and state, there is no sufficient official fire protection, we have no state fire marshal and no enough local fire departments. Twin Falls is in good shape in almost every respect, but like other towns in Idaho it needs better protection from fire.

I call to those years ago as protected against fire. It is now a simple task to keep houses, block and hospital in still standing because of my work.

I shall appreciate it when the Twin Falls council passes a resolution to keep open chimneys.

If anyone doubts the wisdom of this let him walk down Main street and look at the chimneys that need toppling, the stacks on chimneys that have had to be cut which put up to give better draft, then form your opinion.

Remember what happened to Astoria, where a fine little restaurant after a fire had to be closed because it burned down 21 business blocks and drove many families with children out of work. That shows that a good fire department is not enough when such a fire gets under way.

Last month the president of the United States came out with a battle cry to observe a "fire week" and to call him to the people of the whole country to protect their homes from the dreadful fire hazard caused through carelessness. I hope you will all give this letter your careful consideration.

CHRISTMAS SEAL SALE IS ON

The anti-tuberculosis committees handling the Christmas Seal in Twin Falls county are getting their seals well under way today and everything points to a most enthusiastic response from every one. Those in charge are quite enthusiastic over the way the business houses and professional people are co-operating in this splendid movement. The folks in southern Idaho are converted to the Christmas Seal we believe and are going to do their best to put this campaign over and put it over big.

Since the state of Idaho lost their appropriation for a tuberculosis hospital they are all the more anxious to push the Christmas Seal sale and thus give as much protection through this source as possible. Tuberculosis is increasing and this great white menace is a serious problem for the present and future generations of Idaho.

The 1924 seal is the most attractive ever produced in all the 17 years during which the annual seal sale has become a recognized and popular institution. It is printed on better paper than ever before. The adhesive material on the back is more efficient, and the seals are guaranteed to stick where they are put. The color process is a perfect lithographing job. A cut of the seal is shown herewith, and gives some idea of the design, but the seal must be seen for the colors to be appreciated.

They are so artistic as to be the equal of any commercial seal ever put on the market, and advertising experts declare they should sell readily merely for their decorative value.

The design contains the words, "Health Christmas 1924." The red double-barred cross on a white shield bordered in red symbolizes the world wide movement for the prevention of tuberculosis in which are enrolled the International Union against Tuberculosis, the National Tuberculosis Association, 48 state associations, and about 2,000 local associations. This campaign has resulted in a saving of millions of lives throughout the world, and in the United States alone has effected a reduction of the death rate in the past 18 years of more than fifty per cent.

At the left of the seal there is a woman's figure clad in gold drapery holding aloft a torch which symbolizes the hope that has been brought to mankind through the successful efforts of the public movement—a message to the ill that tuberculosis can be cured, and to the well that it can be prevented.

The word "Health" on the seal indicates the enlargement of the tuberculosis movement into a general work for the betterment of public health in all directions. The health program is based on the theory that any educational effort or sanitary measure that tends to improve general health conditions or to prevent any form of disease leads to the eradication of tuberculosis.

The seal was designed by the celebrated artist, Geo. V. Curtis of New York.

The quota of seals for Idaho is three million, five hundred thousand.

EDUCATIONAL PROBLEMS SIMILAR IN DIFFERENT STATES

Similarities among states in the educational problems they must meet and in the methods they use in solving them are far more numerous and emphatic than differences. This is illustrated anew by the State of Rhode Island and the topics for discussion at the annual meeting of the teachers of the state just ended. Rhode Island is not alone the smallest but the most urban in population of all of our states, yet, it, too, is confronted with the difficulty of supplying educational facilities to its rural children equivalent in quality to those furnished in urban communities. Its school system is organized on an administrative plan favorable in many ways to equalization of opportunity and to school centralization; yet a state education official is responsible for the statement that certain communities in that state are confronted with—the most acute and stubborn problem concerned with school centralization in his experience. Apparently not all the difficult problems concerned with rural education, particularly with school centralization, are concentrated in those states usually considered "rural" and having one-teacher schools in large numbers, as New York, Pennsylvania, Iowa, and Kansas. It will be a surprise to many persons to learn that a large, active, interested group of teachers and superintendents constitute the rural and village section of Rhode Island's State Institute of Instruction and that among the subjects of lively interest and animated discussion at the state meeting just closed were those of school consolidation and the transportation of children.
