

### MIDDLE WEST WED IN GRIP OF ELEMENTS

#### More Than 3000 Telephone Poles Are Down in State of Nebraska; Cities and Towns Isolated; Radio Used for Dispatches.

CHICAGO, Dec. 5.—A general breakdown in wire facilities and interruption of railroad traffic has been reported in this territory today as a snow and sleet storm rained in force. Nebraska reported more than 3,000 telegraph and telephone poles down. Many cities and smaller towns were isolated. The United Press was using the radio in Omaha to deliver service to its Nebraska clients. Northern Iowa was suffering from the storm, many Iowa cities isolated. Southern Minnesota and Wisconsin were being swept by a sleet and snow storm. Show and sleet were falling in portions of Illinois and Indiana, interfering with wire traffic.

### New Rate Basis Is Proposed at Salt Lake Meet

SALT LAKE CITY, Dec. 5.—A rate structure on grain and grain products based on a direct differential system or what is known as the Kansas City rate combination basis, was proposed at yesterday's meeting of the state institute for the Grain Exchange to test the reasonableness of established transportation charges on grain and grain products from Utah and Idaho points. The proposal was made by W. H. Scott, Kansas City, representing the Omaha Grain exchange, and the Board of Trade of Kansas City, who agreed with the complaint that a rate adjustment is necessary. The proposal was brought out in direct cross examination. Thus far, three rate schedules, designed to dispose of rate problems, have been proposed by the institute. The Omaha Grain Exchange, as presented Monday by H. W. Prickett, the second vice president of the Board of Trade of the Colorado Milling & Elevator company, and the third by Mr. Scott.

## 'Reduce Production' Is Coolidge's Advice to Nation's Farmers

#### President Suggests Reduction of Production as Remedy for Ills of Agriculture; Talks at Chicago Livestock Exposition Last Night.

### LIBERTY GIVEN BY PARDON BOARD TO CHINESE WARRIORS

CHICAGO, Dec. 5.—Reduce production was the advice President Coolidge gave to farmers in a speech here last night at the international livestock exposition. "Most of the ill of agriculture come from overproduction, Mr. Coolidge declared, and not from failure of the government to devise panacea. "It is not from any lack of government activity these directions that the farmer is suffering," Mr. Coolidge declared emphatically. "The troubles of the farmer are in the farm and in the market. They come largely from overproduction. We are searching for remedies. "The sound remedy is in reduce production and it is a remedy which will automatically pay itself if there is not artificial interference." "The federal government is doing everything within its power to help agriculture attain a secure footing," Mr. Coolidge said, pointing out that five million dollars has been placed at the disposal of the war finance corporation and the agriculture department during the past three years. This money was used to help deflated agricultural districts. "The government will support any sound program to assist the farmer from the individualistic competitive conditions under which agriculture has been conducted," he said. "It must encourage order and centralized marketing as a substitute for the haphazard and wasteful distribution methods of the past. We must help the farmer to reduce his taxes, broaden his foreign market and keep freight rates as low as possible while keeping the railroads efficient." "The president pledged his administration to a searching study of the needs of the farmer and the enactment of laws for their application and observance." General business and commerce would derive great benefit from a prosperous agricultural community; the president declared, intimating that all business men ought to jump in and help the farmer.

### Irregularities in Sale Are Denied by Sugar Company

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 5.—Officials of the Hawaiian Sugar Company and Hawaii now confirming properties formerly owned by H. Heckfeldt and company, a German company, have filed denials to charges of irregularities in the sale of the properties during the war by A. Mitchell Palmer, alias property custodian. The properties were sold for \$7,000,000 and stockholders in the former owning company have filed suit for accounting, claiming the property to have been worth \$17,000,000. Thomas G. Miller, present alien property custodian, is named as one of the defendants. The denial claims that the properties were sold from ruin by the sale, and that the price of \$7,000,000 was a fair price. The officials were implicated in the so-called "Hindu conspiracy," which had wrecked the business, it was claimed.

## DEATH'S LAWS CLOSE ON BOY KILLERS TODAY

#### South Carolina Lads Die in Electric Chair for Murder of Major Samuel H. McCreary of U. S. Army; Brave to Last.

STATE PENITENTIARY, COLUMBIA, S. C., Dec. 5.—Frank Haygood and Merlin King paid the death penalty at dawn today for the murder of Major Samuel H. McCreary, of the United States army. Both of the youthful slayers marched calmly to their death in the state electric chair, their final plea for a continuance of sentence having been denied them by Governor McCreary. Major McCreary was slain on July 30 on a spot highway between Columbia and Orange, King and Haygood were traveling when the army officer, on route in his automobile from Indianola to Charleston, effected a halt. "The men accepted the major's hospitality and when a favorable mood was reached the army officer was ordered from the car, pulled and shot down. The body was hidden in the woods near the road and the slayers drove away. "The major's murder was not suspected until several days later when he failed to call for money sent to him by a neighbor. Officers found his automobile near Canton, S. C., where King was arrested. King implicated Haygood.

## WEST BOUND RAILROADS UNDER WAY

#### East Bound Hearing Concluded and Problem of West Bound Rates Begins Today at Salt Lake; Need Adjustment.

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, Dec. 5.—The east bound rate hearing was concluded here today. The hearing on the rates of the interstate commerce commission at January 21, 1925, as the time for presentation of briefs for the eastbound carriers, the commission and intervenors. The hearing which opened last Saturday occupied five days. Testimony of shippers, intervenors and representatives of the eastbound carriers appeared from all affected territories west of the Missouri river. "The Union Pacific system has discovered at all times to establish a system of freight rates to build up the territory it serves," T. T. Wilson, of Omaha, freight traffic manager of the Union Pacific system testified. "Adjustment of rates is made necessary by the growth of the commercial, agricultural and general interests in the intermountain territory, and particularly in Idaho and Utah has needed adjustment in transportation charges." Examiner Wilson will open hearings on similar complaints of the Great Grain Exchange on west bound rates today. Opening of the hearing on the west bound case was made possible by postponement of a hearing on passenger traffic matters at Boulder, Colo., before Examiner Witter. The west bound hearing is expected to extend into next week. "Mr. Wilson, who occupied the stand a large part of the day, admitted defects in the general rate structure but claimed that those imperfections, which constituted fourth section violations in some cases, will be corrected by amending lines over which the Union Pacific had no control, having been placed in the hands of other carriers. He said that these defects in the rate structure were being rapidly corrected. Mr. Wilson said.

Twin Falls county seed growers took nine prizes at the International Seed show just held in Chicago. This is perhaps more than our share from a geographical point, but Idaho is producing the very finest seeds that can be produced and we are also producing an abundance of same. More than seventy exhibitors entered in the red clover seed class alone and yet our county walked away with the prizes. As a matter of fact our exhibitors won second, fourth, sixth, thirteenth and fourteenth prizes. In the alsike class E. R. Brooks of Buhl won second and W. H. Harvey of the same place won fourth.

The Father and Son banquet held last evening in the Methodist church was one of the greatest strides forward for better citizenship we have noted in Twin Falls for many a day. Father and son sat down together and consumed with one another as a "family and his people" and officer offered a very timely suggestion when he stated that every parent or guardian should know where their children are after nine o'clock and what kind of company they are keeping if they would mend the morals of the community.

PUBLIC HEALTH SERVICE STUDIES INFLUENZA.

The common cold is the most prevalent illness in the United States and apparently many such colds are quite contagious, says the Surgeon General of the Public Health Service, few people failing to experience at least one attack during a twelve-month period, while many persons have three or more attacks during that time. These facts are borne out by data recently secured by officers of the Public Health Service in an investigation of influenza and the minor respiratory diseases which they are conducting at the present time.

That large numbers of persons have colds each year is common knowledge but just what percentage of people, as a rule, have attacks and the average number of colds per person per year have not been known, as the disease is not required to be reported by law, and, therefore, the morbidity records do not show that information.

In a preliminary report of the investigation that is now in progress, the Public Health Service shows that, among a fairly representative group of persons, only 10 per cent had no colds, while 90 per cent had one or more colds during a five and one-half month period; the rate for the group as a whole being 1.9 colds per person, or an annual rate of 3.7 colds per person should the same rate obtain throughout the year.

The cold was found to be the predominant form of respiratory attack. The relative frequency of symptoms was shown to be very much the same for all localities, and the epidemic outbreaks occurred apparently at about the same time of year in each locality. An outbreak of colds usually occurred in all localities in October, followed by a decline until the latter part of December, at which time another outbreak occurred.

It is now believed that there may be a closer correlation between the common cold and influenza than was formerly thought to exist. There seems to be cases of common cold and ordinary influenza which are almost indistinguishable clinically, and the bacteriological findings in the nose and throat of influenza sufferers and persons having a common cold are as far as the evidence goes practically the same. As a matter of fact, even in health the bacteria found in the minor respiratory diseases are nearly always present, which at once suggests that good resistance provided by physical fitness is an important line of defense, since a lowered vitality and lowered resistance favor infection.

Fitness alone, however, as robust persons may apparently contract a cold from an infected person. The investigation now being undertaken by the Public Health Service is the first nationwide study of influenza and colds ever made, and the final results are awaited with much interest, in the hope that further light will be shed on these affections which yearly cause much suffering, inconvenience, economic loss, and, in the case of influenza, even deaths, and which, as far as their cause and prevention are concerned, are still comparatively little understood.

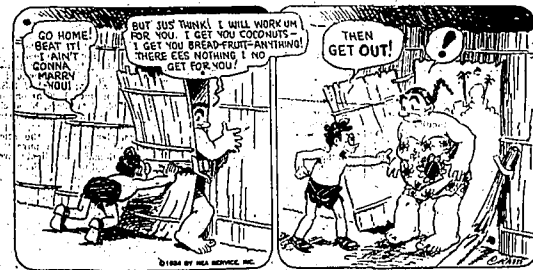

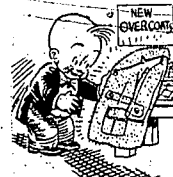

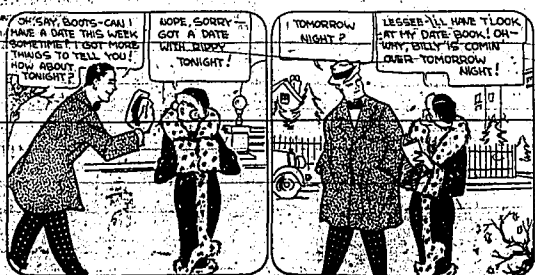

The Steunenberg Memorial Association was formed at a meeting held at Boise, Idaho, attended by representative men from all portions of the State...

The purpose of the Association is the collection of funds to pay for, and the erection of a suitable monument to perpetuate the memory of ex-Governor Steunenberg.

Frank Steunenberg was born at Kosciusko, Iowa, August 6th, 1861. His parents came from Holland. He was educated in the public schools of Iowa and graduated from the State Agricultural College at Ames.

In 1896 he was nominated for Governor and received the largest majority ever given to a candidate in Idaho, receiving nearly 80 per cent of the popular vote. He came into office during a time of financial depression...

He was re-elected in 1898, and the next year the crisis came in the life of the State...

After his resignation he actively engaged in assisting large plans for developing the resources of the State. With no further political ambitions, he was devoting his entire time to the upbuilding of Idaho...

This struggle to preserve the State against organized lawlessness he was bitterly assailed, and his life daily threatened...

Frank Steunenberg was of the rarest type of manhood. Open, sincere, modest and unassuming, he was in his purposes and plans as inflexible as bronze itself.

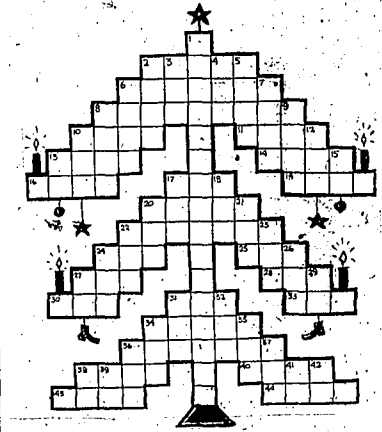

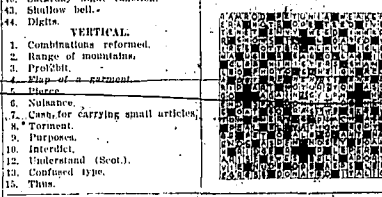
