

Victory for Moderation In German Elections Is Predicted; Vote Sunday

NEW REICHTAG TO BE ELECTED

BERLIN, Dec. 6.—A victory for moderation and the republican groups which comprise democrats and socialists, was forecast today at the eve of Germany's national election.

Manifest Great Interest in Political Race; Trend Indicated.

For the second time this year, elections will climax new political activity in the Reichstag. Simultaneous, widely staged elections will be held in Prussia and Saxony.

Reced. Local Elections have Indicated that the Nationalists would restore a monarchy and the communists, who would establish a soviet government, will be the losers.

BERLIN, Dec. 6.—German voters go to the polls tomorrow for the second time this year to elect a new Reichstag.

Simultaneously elections for the Prussian diet will be held.

In a sense, this Reichstag will be the first true "people's diet" parliament since the German republic.

The question of fulfillment of the Dawes plan has played a certain role in the election campaign.

However, tomorrow's results will in no wise restrict any of Germany's avowed acceptance of the Dawes regime.

The great feature of the Sunday struggle is the fact that the nationalists are on the defensive.

The nationalist party contains most of those who are expected to get monarchoy restored to the Vaterland.

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THE REPUBLIC WILL STAND.

In tomorrow's elections, they must register their faith in the republic.

WENDELL TURKEY PROFITABLE TO THE PRODUCERS

It is estimated that Wendell-turkey growers have received better than \$20000 for turkeys marketed for the Thanksgiving trade within the past two weeks. While this figure is an estimate, yet it is believed that an accurate check could be had for the exact amount paid the farmers here for birds the amount would exceed the above figure. Of the above estimated \$20000, the Wendell Poultry company has paid out within the past two weeks for turkeys and chickens \$120000. In addition to this figure the Sand streets farm shipped frozen birds and any number of farmers sold their turkeys through the Turkey Growers' association, of which we have no exact figures, but have received some information to lead us to make the above estimate and we believe we are low.

The Wendell Poultry company shipped out the last car load of turkeys for the Thanksgiving trade, last Saturday, early in the morning. The Wendell Poultry company at San Francisco, and contained 2700 turkeys weighing 2,600 pounds. The company has shipped almost three car loads within the last two weeks, have handled a little better than 5000 turkeys and have paid out to the farmers for the birds \$120000.

At San Francisco, one of our turkey growers, shipped nearly a ton of turkeys to Chicago last week. Mr. Sanderson received 10¢ per pound for the birds delivered in Chicago. He shipped them by express and the express charges were \$2.50 per 100 pounds. These birds were exceptionally fine quality No. 1 turkeys.

It is estimated that there are about 700 car loads of turkeys in the tract to be shipped out for the Christmas trade. Of the four cars left, the last car was shipped in the middle of the month of December. This farm is going in for turkey raising on a large scale this year. Practically every farm on the tract had a few turkeys this year, ranging from twenty to thirty birds up to a hundred. The Wendell section is ideal for turkey raising and next year it is expected that the above estimate has raised than ever before.—Wendell Institution.

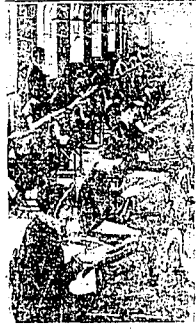

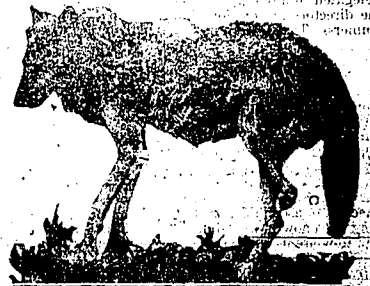

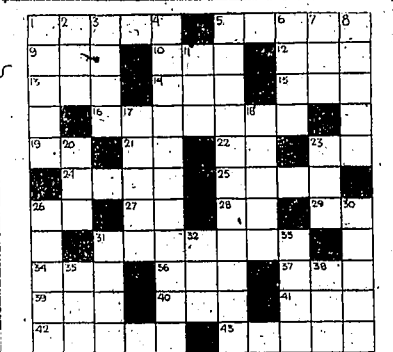

NON SUPPORT IS CAUSE OF DIVORCE SUIT

Wife of Peter H. Johnson Asserts That Husband Promised Good Home and Furniture as Inducement to Wed and Now Refuses to Support Her

Charges of refusal to provide her in a manner which to furnish her ordinary comfort or which are in accordance with his pre-marriage agreements and financial resources are contained in a pleading filed this afternoon by Sweetley & Sweetley in behalf of Mrs. M. Johnson against Peter H. Johnson.

The complaint claims that her husband has for some of \$800 a month and asks for \$200 per month, alimony and an accounting of the separate property since the day of their marriage, November 24.

The complaint, which covers ten pages of typewritten pages details the charges in considerable length. It alleges that as an inducement to get her to marry him, Mr. Johnson represented an income to her of \$200 a month for the maintenance of the new, comfortable home with equipment such as a piano, refrigerator, central standing boiler, etc.

The complaint says that the room is inferiorly but in the summer months it is unfit for anyone to live in, and that the defendant, knowing this, has required the plaintiff to stay and live there but she avoided the effects of such conditions himself by the use of his motor car during the day and returning away from the apartment during the heat of the day, and that he would not take her with him.
