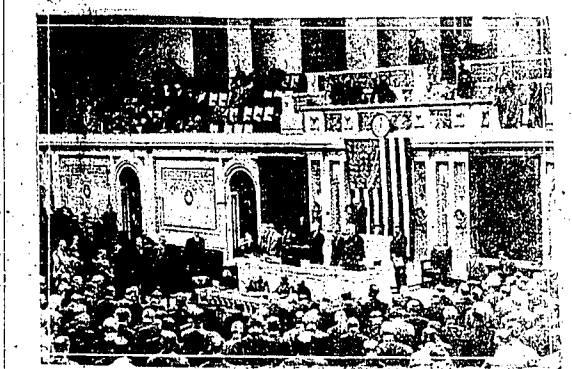

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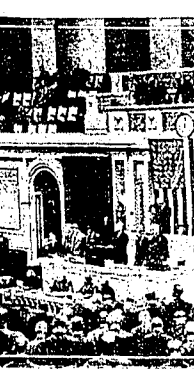

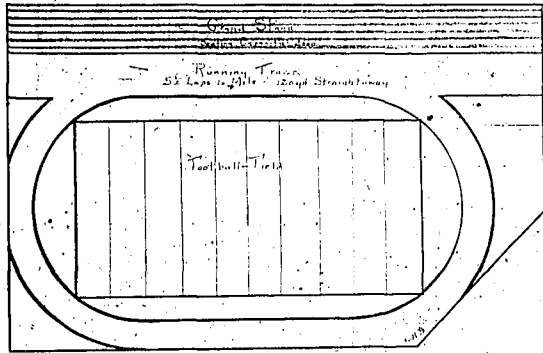

NEWS OF THE SPORT WORLD

Proposed New Lincoln Field

Twin Falls high school needs a new athletic field. We need a cinder running track, a baseball field, a football field, which could be provided on a large expense, and which would allow Twin Falls in a class by itself in state athletic circles, besides being a fitting reward for the work of the high school athletes who have found no leniency for Twin Falls High. There are few cinder tracks in the state and these are confined mostly to universities. Despite the comparatively small cost of such a luxury not many schools in the northwest possess one. If equipped with a cinder running track, Twin Falls would no longer be envied the district and probably the sectional competition which is held annually to determine those who shall go to the state meet, which this year is to be held at Pocatello. Local fans hold the opinion that football, baseball and track cannot be held successfully at the same field and that, since 1919, the city baseball diamond in the south part of the city, could be had for baseball, leaving Lincoln field exclusively for football and track.

Baseball and track came at the same time of the year and conditions at the same field. (Alameda) field is not adapted to baseball, the field is held below ground. The field, however, is superb as a location for track and football and if improved as it would well be, would serve as a magnet in drawing the cream of the games and events to Twin Falls.

Year football fields are becoming more common each year in the west. Many high schools have installed their grounds, making the field of better quality and more country. Grass fields make for faster exhibitions in the same measure as cinder running tracks make for more speed. Local track aspirants have suffered from a lack of proper facilities for training. Never have the boys had the chance to train that they deserved. The time is now ripe for a combined football, cinder and running track which would aid materially the athletic life of the school. The expense would be minimal compared with the benefits derived. Several prominent local persons have already offered to donate their services in putting the thing over should the plan meet the approval of the school board.

The above sketch shows clearly how Lincoln field would appear if the various changes suggested were made. It shows part of the standard track and the bleachers extended, a large seating capacity of 2,000 temporary additional stands could be erected on the cinder track on the opposite side of the field should they be needed for the big football game and season is not. With a turf field one game need be called off on account of a muddy field. Under the above plan a large car is provided for the short distance and the high school has with the 120 yard straddling which the track affords while the lower bank has the horse track, will run with one turn as is customary on smaller fields where a 250 yard straddling cannot be afforded. The broad jump, high jump and pole vault runways and pits can be laid off on the turf directly in front of the grand stand between the running track and the cinder ground providing spectators with a good view of each event as it runs off.

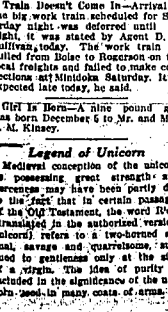
