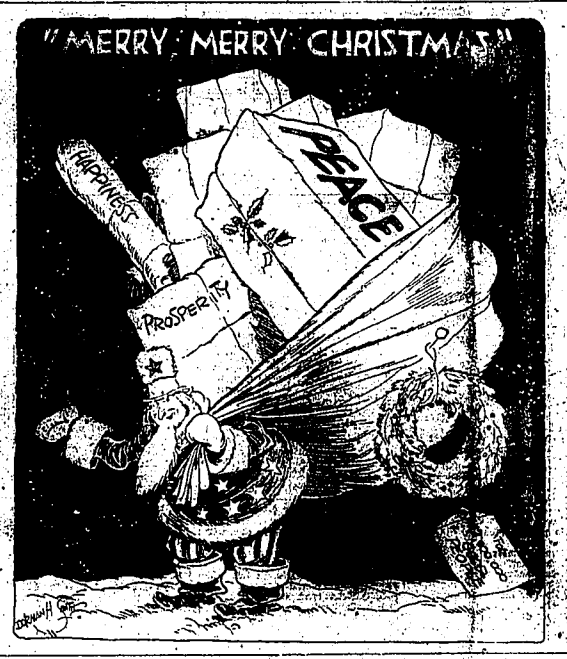

**JAPANESE PAY TAX BUT ENJOY THE LUXURIES**  
 TOKYO, Dec. 24.—The Government of the so-called "yellow peril" full Japanese July 23 apparently is not having the desired effect of encouraging thrift and economy. It was indignantly rebuffed by the lawmakers.

The government has been taking every effort to encourage the Japanese people to save. It has levied a tax on every article of luxury. The tax is a 100 per cent upon stuff on items declared to be luxuries. The Japanese are not so miserly as they are credited to be. During October the Japanese in Yokohama spent more than \$2,000,000. This compared with only \$2,000,000 for the same period last year. The government has been taking an interest in the national question. The government hopes that the Japanese people will be wiser and that the luxuries in the Japanese market will be reduced. It is understood by officials at the foreign office that no change is contemplated.

The Twin Falls churches have been holding some very remarkable musical programs in keeping with the Christmas holiday season. These programs have been unusually meritorious and the churches and citizens should be appreciative of the splendid talent in this line which usually works without compensation on such and many other occasions.

Will you play the Big Brother to some poor family between now and tomorrow and bring real joy to yourself and happiness to the family you help? Twin Falls has quite a number of real needy people and you need not look over the hill to find some one who needs material help. Just the other day a man with a family went out and almost begged a farmer for labor at a dollar a day in order that his family might have enough to eat.

There is an important election to take place shortly after the first of the year by the directors for the Twin Falls Canal company. This will concern the stockholders more than they think at the present time and some very vital issues are concerned for the people of Twin Falls as well. Those who are inclined to pass out their proxies with very little consideration had better think things over rather carefully. The issues are such that every stockholder would do well to be present and vote his own stock. When you leave important affairs to other people you are likely to be sorry later on.

The reply of President W. S. McCarthy of the Intermediate Rate association to Captain Everett M. Sweeley shows clearly that there are two sides to the shield. President McCarthy admits that Captain Sweeley makes some good points, with which all will agree, but argues that the advantages of the present arrangement wherein the long and short haul plan is prohibited far exceeds the disadvantages and that the balance is on the side of the Gooding bill. The Times is glad to be afforded an opportunity of presenting its readers both sides of this question by competent disputants, both able and both honest. The argument of Captain Sweeley and the frank admission of President McCarthy that it has good points, places the discussion on a high plane, which cannot fail to arouse thought on the part of the people. Even should they all agree on the wisdom of the Gooding bill, they will do so after thought and not simply on the say-so of the senator and his friends, and they will have reason for the faith that is in them.

"Everywhere, Everywhere, Christmas Tonight," since the happy kiddies with an enthusiasm which at least once a year should inspire their elders with the real Christmas spirit of which we hear so much, and which is not always practiced or appreciated. "There is a time for everything" and Christmas should be a time of joy, and love and of spiritual equality. It would be quite incongruous for anyone claiming to be a Christian to assume an air of superiority on the anniversary of the birth of The Christ in so lowly a stable. Christmas, then, should be a time of real fraternity. What is given to the needy should be given in the same spirit which one brother or sister would show to another in extending some courtesy, or assistance, not in the spirit of condescension. On the other hand, what is received should be received in the same spirit, whether by people of the same or of different social status or financial position. In this way alone can Christmas give us a source of real Christian joy and of spiritual consolation to the giver and the receiver. In this way alone can there be realized in the world full import of the song of the children, "Everywhere, Everywhere, Christmas Tonight."

STAMP OUT THE GREAT WHITE PLAGUE

One of the most hopeful and most dramatic fights ever made against disease is the one that is rapidly stamping out tuberculosis. One of the oldest of the plagues that have afflicted men, "Tuberculosis," has gone steadily on for nearly thirty centuries, stealthily marking its victims and leaving them to a lingering death. This was the diabolical nature of the disease emphasized, for its slow approach caused no alarm, but permitted the sure spread of the infection. Other plagues have gone blundering about their work, and men have risen up and accepted the challenge and beaten them back. Many diseases far more deadly than tuberculosis now cause but a handful of deaths yearly, while the White Plague claims, year after year, would make a big city.

But we started out to tell you about the other side of the picture. In a word, it is this: Tuberculosis can be prevented and it can be cured. In less than twenty years, by an intensive campaign of education and care, the death rate has been more than cut in two. It must be cut in two again and then again, and finally stamped out. We can't afford, nationally or individually, to have the disease around. It is estimated that it would cost twenty-six billion dollars to endure the disease in its present stage for the next thirty-five years; but that it could be controlled, which would mean practically wiping it out, for only seven billion dollars. This would mean a net saving of nineteen billion dollars and all the millions of lives that would otherwise be wasted. It sounds like a good business proposition, to say the least.—Exchange.
