## STANFORD MEN LOSE TO NOTRE DAME GRIDDEES

### Rockne's Team Gets Break and Wins by Score of 27-10; Westerners Make More Yardage and Fig- ures Show Cards the Best Team.

PARADISE, Calif., Jan. 2.—Buried with their laurels as the world's greatest football team, the mighty Irish of Notre Dame were to break outward today, leaving behind them the memory of a brilliant demonstration of gridiron strategy.

In the midst of Pasadena's 10th Tournament of Roses, Knute Rockne's team started to help a football team by defeating the visiting Warner's big Stanford squad under a 27 to 10 score. Representing the east in the annual classic, Notre Dame pulled out with a victory as the first visiting eleven to tear the trick-kick Harold Hunkeler's grip in 1925.

A wonderful game of Elmore Layden of Notre Dame who intercepted two forward passes to run almost the length of the field for touchdowns, divided the honors for the day with Ernie Nevers, his full back, who played his first full game of this season after being crippled by broken ankles early in the year.

Perfect interception, snapping into action with speed and precision, formation of the Irish played for the day with the Stanford defense. Notre Dame's own defensive work was a marvel of efficiency. As evidenced by the two interceptions, forward passes that counted so heavily in the score, the Irish had a widespread network of men in which the Stanford ball carriers found themselves cumbered.

The work of Captain Walsh of the Irish, playing his last game for his alma mater, was the best individual defensive hit on the field. (It was here that he first everywhere, smelling out the plays that were to be as they launched against his line.

It was hardly a demonstration of eastern football versus the western style. Each team played for the win as its weight and speed directed that it should. In all fundamentals the style of play was largely the same, differing only insofar as Knute's style differs from that of "Pop" Warner.

Notre Dame gained most of the breaks but Stanford made the Cardinals to a large extent, but therefore for the Irish followed the ball and when a red player let it slip, a youth from South Bend was always there to cover it.

The figures show Stanford the best team, but the breaks don't appear in figures. Stanford made 17 first downs to Notre Dame's seven; completed 11 forward passes to Notre Dame's three; gained 231 1/2 yards from scrimmage to 105 for the Irish; made 12 1/2 yard on forward passes to Notre Dame's 48 and was penalized on the Irish's four times.

But the Irish victory has been the speed of its backfield, in total to a large extent. In this sentence of the official summary:

Yards gained on intercepted passes—Stanford 7; Notre Dame 12 1/2.

To this is added a gain by the visitors of 264 yards on punts while Stanford netted 22.

"It is true we got the breaks, but we couldn't have done it without Coach Rockne after the game. It is one thing to get the breaks and another thing to take advantage of them. Stanford had a wonderful game but we won fairly, playing the ball as it came to us and we hope to give credit for our line."

"Pop" Warner, Stanford mentor, has a different opinion.

"I congratulate Notre Dame on her victory, but we better get 21 points," Warner said. "They earned but six

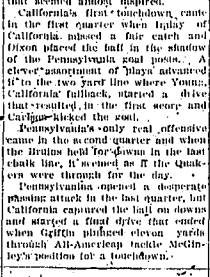
