13,000 MILE FLEET CRUISE IS SCHEDULED

Admiral Eberle Says Voyage Will Be Most Ambitious Program Ever Attempted; of Value to Ships and Crew.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 8.—In its fleet maneuvers on the Pacific coast during the spring the navy will undertake the most ambitious program ever attempted according to Admiral Edward W. Eberle, chief of naval operations.

Under plans for sending the Atlantic and Pacific fleets to Hawaiian waters for maneuvers and then to Hawaii for a cruise, Eberle estimates that more than 13,000 miles will be traversed.

From the extensive maneuvers Eberle believes both the personnel and machinery of the navy will be benefited.

The machinery, after one of those "shape" tests when "it is better to have it broken than to have it like any machine which you do not know much, or only a little, about."

Under present plans the combined fleet will steam out from San Francisco in the latter part of April and "start a problem" against the Hawaiian Islands, defended by army and district naval forces.

"After the 'attack' on the islands the fleet will test anchorages, which are very limited."

"The fleet will practically have to anchor in open sea," Eberle said, "and we want to see how the fleet could anchor an anchorage and be maintained in all kinds of weather."

Maneuvers are expected to be completed by the middle of June and the fleet will return to the Atlantic coast by the first of July.

NEW YORK, Jan. 8.—A dream that was idle before a while, ambition that was vain to stately riches, will be realized Sunday night when Carmela and Rosa Ponselle sing together at a Metropolitan concert.

The story begins years ago at the little town of Meridan, Conn., where the Ponselle sisters began their careers as children singers.

Carmela, the elder sister, stopped singing at Meridan to be educated for an operatic career. Whatever her own ambitions may have been, they were looked in her favor, as she continued to sing in vaudeville to finance the younger sister's training.

Rosa's sensational triumph six years ago when she sang with Caruso in "La Forza del Destino" seemed the fulfillment of Carmela's sacrifice.

Recently there came the turn of fate which brought her reward. Carmela sang in the role of "Carmela" in the opera "La Forza del Destino" at the Metropolitan opera house.

"It will be the first time the Metropolitan has arranged such a family affair since Jean de Reszke and his brothers sang from the same stage."

Folks from the Connecticut town where Rosa and Carmela first sang turned out with a brass band to hail the younger sister's triumph six years ago. They are coming down from Mexico, Conn., Sunday to show their appreciation of success that came at last to Carmela Ponselle.

Ford Requested to Retract His Saprio Articles

CHICAGO, Jan. 8.—Aaron Saprio, counsel for several farmers' co-operative organizations yesterday mailed a letter to the editorial department asking for retraction in view of his impending libel suit for \$100,000. This document asking for retraction is required by Michigan state laws as a preliminary to any libel action.

Saprio said that the suit would be filed in 30 days if Ford did not make the retraction of certain libel articles appearing in Ford's journal, the Dearborn Independent. The articles in question linked his name with Bernard Baruch, Otto Kahn, Julius Rosenwald, Isaac Meyer Jr. and Alfred D. Lawler, all millionaires.

BURIED TOWN IS FOUND IN NEVADA WILDS

Discovery May Prove to Be One of Greatest Archaeological Finds in North America; Bodies Exhumed; Gems Found

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Jan. 8.—Far back in the untrodden recesses of Nevada, near the junction of the Virgin river and Muddy creek, the ruins of a city have been discovered, one which will probably prove among the greatest archaeological finds in North American history, according to Professor James G. Stewart of Nevada.
