

Arrested Kansas Governor on Charge of Soliciting And Accepting a Bribe

RUSSELL DAVIS ALSO ARRESTED

Both Appear at the Court House and Sign Bonds of \$1,000 Each.

TOPEKA, Kan., Jan. 12.—The trial of allegations of bribery in connection with the parole of prisoners from the Kansas penitentiary, was made by Jonathan Russell Davis, retiring governor of Kansas, in his address at the inauguration of Governor Ira S. Tamm.

The special holding of arrest of Davis and his son, Russell, was being accepted by Fred Pollman, parolee, parolee, in payment of that parolee.

Both Davis appeared on the platform before the opening of six thousand dollars in the form of the inauguration overvalued by the "arrest" of their retiring governor's parolee, and the "arrest" was through the crowd.

TOPEKA, Kan., Jan. 12.—For the first time in the history of the state, a governor was arrested while in office today.

Warrant charging soliciting and accepting a bribe was returned against Governor Jonathan S. Davis and his son, Russell Davis, in connection with acceptance by the latter of \$25,000 from Fred Pollman, a parolee, for a parole for Pollman.

The governor and his son, an hour before the former was to relinquish his office to Gov. S. Tamm, the state executive appeared at the court house to sign bonds of \$1,000 each, and the latter to sign the bonds of \$1,000 each.

Accompanying the governor were two sons, who will represent the governor in the inauguration.

Accompanying the governor were also present, Governor Davis talked to the crowd, and then returned to the building and went back to the state building.

BRITISH WARSHIP RUSHED TO ZONE OF DISTURBANCE

Activity Feared Following Seizure of City by Leader.

SHANGHAI, Jan. 12.—A British warship was rushed here from Wei Jai Wei today and strong contingents of police and volunteers were posted along the boundaries of the foreign settlement for protection against possible incursions of panicky Chinese following the seizure of the city.

Almost without firing a shot, troops of the former Chi Li commander surrounded the native barracks here, rounded up three divisions of the force and effected a bloodless coup d'etat.

Meanwhile others of Chi's troops were defeating an P.T. regulars fighting about five miles from Shanghai.

Immediately after the coup broke here, American and other foreigners took steps to guard the French and international settlements.

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POWERS REACH HARMONY OVER DEBT PAYMENT

U. S. Accorded Fifty-two Million Gold Marks to Begin in '26.

PARIS, Jan. 12.—The United States has been accorded 52,000,000 gold marks yearly out of the Dawes payments, beginning in 1926, according to an agreement reached today, British officials announced semi-officially.

Official announcement is expected at tomorrow's cabinet session of the British conference.

Priority rights to claim payments for the costs of the Rhine army were conceded by the powers and it is estimated it will take 10 years of payments at this rate to actual.

Regarding her claim for war damages out of the payments to be made by Germany under the Dawes plan the United States will receive two and one-fourth per cent of the annual payments during the first and second operation of the plan.

If the British announcement is officially confirmed, it means that the plan, in the secret conference for the past week, has been arranged to meet the claims of the United States of the amounts they expect to collect from Germany.

NEW PAMPHLET GIVES OUT INFORMATION ON RAIL RATE MEASURE

SPRINGS, Wash., Jan. 12.—Shall railroads which have been granted the Panama canal and other benefits be allowed to raise their rates? This is the question of a pamphlet published by the Interstate Commerce Commission.

A pamphlet of the Interstate Commerce Commission, answering a pertinent question dealing with the Gooding bill, and short haul bill (Senate Bill 2287), is a brief and concise handbook of information on the bill.

The pamphlet of the rate association is a question of importance in consideration of the long and short bill. The questions and answers are as follows:

1. What is the Gooding bill? The Gooding bill (S. 2287) was introduced by the United States senate last May by the overwhelming vote of 64 to 22. On one occasion the Mississippi river voted against it.

2. Why are they opposing the Gooding bill? The Western transportation bill, which is the Gooding bill, is a measure to provide for the construction of a Panama canal and other benefits.

3. How much money will be required to build the Panama canal? The Panama canal will cost \$400,000,000.

PUBLIC FORUM

NEEDS OF SOUTHERN IDAHO

What is wrong with southeastern Idaho, especially with the Twin Falls town, are happily located. We have an area of water right in our midst. We have a variety of crops, especially, vegetables duplicated on any farming community. Why, then, are we hard up?

First of all, people of this tract and also outsiders, came here, bought land, and built up a business with the firm intention of settling before their payments came due; just as they would get a profit and get out of it. This condition had to stop somewhere. It did, and sorry for those who were caught, but a number of them were very unskillful and therefore should be thankful indeed.

Second, the money made in prospecting was misappropriated in buying mining notes, oil stock, automobile stock, auto, etc. and it also got to be quite a habit of "let the hired man do the work, but would he? We got over our apes, learned our lesson, now let us get to work.

We need a backing plant, a flouring plant, a woolen mill, a cannery, a tannery and a number of other industries. How can we get them and what inducements have we got? We have got the raw materials and fairly good agricultural facilities, but we are too far away from coal to drive our machinery and power rates are too high.

high. Can we afford to give each factory a bonus of \$50,000 to \$100,000 as an inducement to come here? If so that we cannot. It comes here. If so that we cannot. It comes here. If so that we cannot. It comes here.

We have a large amount of power going to waste; some belonging to the Twin Falls canal company and some to private parties, which is available at small cost. As the towns and their farmers are equal beneficiaries they should share alike in the use of the power. The towns can always take care of themselves, so that it can be in water power. This accomplished, we will be able to reach the speculators and non-producers of power who are equally benefited.

We have approximately 200,000 acres under the Twin Falls Canal system. If we are paying from 60 to 70 cents on top of our regular maintenance for two years, we will not need to float more bonds, but can pay for them.

A power plant of this kind should cost more than \$500,000. If the town assumes from one-third to one-half the former can easily pay the rest. We can select probably one-half dozen municipalities most convenient to the Twin Falls tract, for certain length of time, and after this time has expired charge them for the electricity they consume. What power is not needed for those select institutions can be sold. There will always be a demand for power.

Some of my friends have asked me what about the Idaho Power company. I may say this: If we get the Idaho Power company will be greatly benefited by it as our population will be greatly increased, and in a much shorter time.

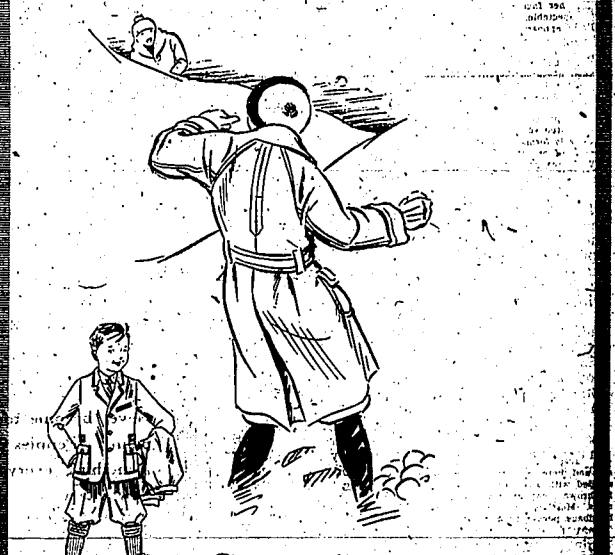

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MANY FINE PROXIES AT CANAL CO.

Indications of Large Attendance and Interest in the Election of Directors of Responsibility for Continuance of Water Exchange and Matter of Water Development from State to State.

More persons have filed proxies at the canal company office than ever before in its history, indicating great interest in the election of directors and policy of the company which will be determined tomorrow. Aside from the usual discussion of responsibility for water exchange, and the question of power development, no outstanding issue has developed.

Opposition to the system of exchange of storage water in Jackson Lake which has prevailed for several years, and to state which action is pending in the state courts; enforcement of the various laws; investigation as to probable cost of developing water in the canal, which conservation of power through through flumes if feasible; commendation of activities of the canal company; extension of the canal; endorsement of Manager Burton Smith, and endorsement of the state law to permit development of water power by canal.

The resolutions met with unanimous support so far as general policy was concerned and all were specifically and unanimously endorsed in terms except the one regarding the conduct of the board members with reference to water exchange. In this case a minority held that the manner of expressing the wishes of the company was such as to inject it into the proceedings.
