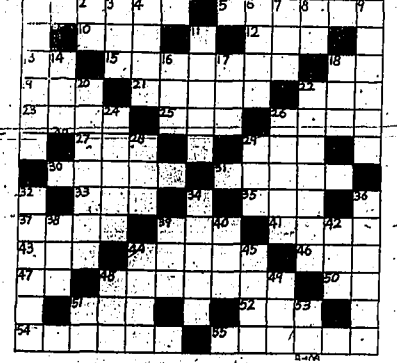
CROSSWORD PUZZLE

RIXEY ONE OF MOST UNIQUE CHARACTERS

Tall Virginian Pitches His Twelfth Year in Majors.

Eppa Rixey closed his twelfth year as a pitcher in major league company with a record of 15 games won for the season. But an error on Aug. 7, No. and yet not so bad. The veteran won 15 out of 20 games, a pretty good record for a pitcher who expects to pitch with club that did not finish one, two, three in the pennant standing. When one considers that the average pitcher in 1924 pitched in less than ten years and the full bloom of effectiveness is five years or less, the 1924 record of the tall Cincinnati pitcher is rather impressive. And especially fertile record impressive when one considers what Rixey did for his club in 1923.

Pitching his eleventh big-league year, the Virginian won 20 and lost 12 games this year. He was somewhat overworked by the marvellous record of League, who pitched on the same team last year with Rixey and all the pitchers in the world who performed 27 victories and only 8 defeats.

Rixey really had one of his great years in 1923, and considering the strain on his ancient arm while compiling that record, his 1924 showing of 15 victories is an impressive feat. It is shown here that Rixey, with his 20 victories in 1924 was six years past his full pitching bloom. The percentage of big-league pitchers who win 20 games after their tenth year on the big time is mighty small. Possibly not more than a dozen such pitching giants appear in the majors during a decade.

Rixey himself is just as impressive as his pitching averages. He is the tallest man in baseball, standing five feet five inches in height, and he is also the slenderest man in baseball. As a pitcher in the world who has been benched from the hips to deliver his curves. In spite of his height, he is a real pitcher, with an action and skill. Rixey is also one of the smartest of the ball players. He is a graduate of the University of Virginia, coming straight to Philadelphia in the National league after three years on the mound for his college.

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When it comes to disposition, Rixey leads them all, eludes in baseball or any other walk of life. He has the best disposition on record. Anyone who has spent a day with the tall pitcher around the clubhouse, on the bench, on the practice field, or in the hotel lobby, will see any kind of weather conditions, playing conditions or state of the pennant race, or harassment that falls to the lot of the pitcher in any way, will see a smiling, pleasant, cheerful, jasting, not only refusing to let his own troubles weigh on him, but driving away the troubles of those with whom he comes in contact.

As a remarkable type, this man Rixey. His way to his club in the matter of disposition would seem to be worth about as much as his pitching ability. It is simply impossible to withstand his pleasant smile, his sense of humor and his happy, boyish ways. Twelve years of competing in clubhouses and on the field have left no visible marks upon this veteran's character. He is just as light-hearted and as gay and as full of enthusiasm as the first-drafted recruit. But let us understand Rixey. Under this smiling exterior and this plainness, there is an apparent inflexion of the rook, light a strong, manly and dependable character. Rixey is a man of superior intelligence, a man of thought and study, who besides having mastered the profession of baseball, has also mastered the profession of dentistry. 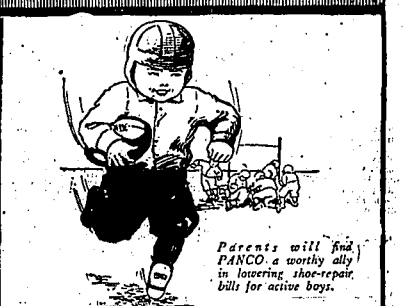
should they proceed at once before exchanging any, they could stop it. Miller was opposed to the idea of exchanging. He said that Mr. Board had no authority from the Board to bind it.

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BIG SURPLUS GATHERS IN CITY FUNDS

At Present Rate the Expenditures Will Run Nearly \$11,000 Below the General Appropriations for the Year; Dr. Grooms Makes Satisfactory Explanation of Garbage Situation to Commission.

That Twin Falls will have a surplus of more than \$4000 at the conclusion of the present year over the amount of revenue expended, and that the expenditures for the year will be nearly \$11,000 less than the general fund appropriations, were conclusions drawn in an estimate prepared and furnished by City Clerk J. L. Rice last night to the council, which heard a vigorous explanation of the garbage situation work of Grooms & McCoy, by Dr. H. B. Grooms, its manager, before the council. The installation of the new plant at the White Rock sanitary landfill, which was attached in this case was that the location and installation about conform to the city ordinance, a complaint of W. M. Turner, held over from the last meeting regarding what he considered the water meter set at his place outside the city limits, was postponed indefinitely.

Use Little Water

The main objection of Mr. Turner lies in the fact that he uses only 100 or 200 gallons of water a month, and the minimum charge for 4000 gallons comes high. He put in some pipes to get the water which is now coming him, relatively, a good deal more. It was held that no separate rate could be made for a consumer and that any change must be made under general revision of ordinance.

Large Saving Monthly

There was a large saving monthly. Figures showing a large monthly saving were submitted by City Clerk Rice. They were informally laid before council members as follows: Domestic fuel, approximately \$100; one month's allowance, \$365.82; expended, \$185.44; savings, \$120.38. Eight months' allowance, \$85.44; expended, \$61.34; savings, \$24.10.

Actual Revenue Exceeding to the City to Date

Actual revenue exceeding to the city to date (including taxes) is approximately \$12,000. Water rentals for four months at \$800 per month, a conservative estimate, \$3,200.

Dr. Grooms Explains Situation

Dr. Grooms, in behalf of his firm said that he regretted that he had not been asked to explain the situation in the city at the last meeting.

Increased efficiency in prevention of losses of distribution was an outstanding feature in the report of Burton Smith, general manager of the Twin Falls canal system, read at the meeting of stockholders at the Orpheum theatre today. The report covered many topics important to the district in general, and concluded that the much discussed water exchange was not just a year, but a year and a half in the time when drafted.

Highway District Report Showing for Year 1925

Commissioners Have Accomplished Much During the Twelve Months Ending December 31, 1924

The Twin Falls Highway district balance sheet published heretofore summarized the condition of the district, and was submitted to the meeting of the board last Saturday afternoon. Details of construction activities for the year are given in the complete report submitted.

Achievements of 1924

During the year 22.6 miles were graded, graveling being done on roads that were not graded in 1923. Gravel used in road construction amounted to 25,828 cubic yards, which was obtained from five gravel pits as follows: Cedar Creek, 8775; Deep Creek, 6072; Vineyard, Jerome county, 4017; Hurley, 2018; Rock Creek, 2355. Fifty seven permanent structures were installed during the year.

Maintenance Operations Included

Supervision of 300 miles of earth roads. This work was done under supervision of foremen in each of the seven divisions which divide the district in divided road maintenance total cost was \$5522.20, divided as follows: Labor, \$4104.21; material, \$1418.00; truck, \$527.99. Bridge maintenance cost \$3300.25, divided as follows: Labor, \$2300; material, \$1000.25; contract (Twin Falls bridge floor, \$434; truck, \$225).

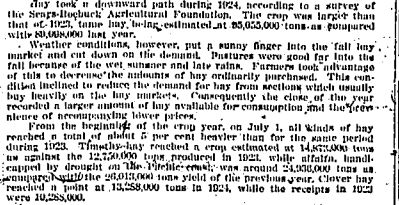
