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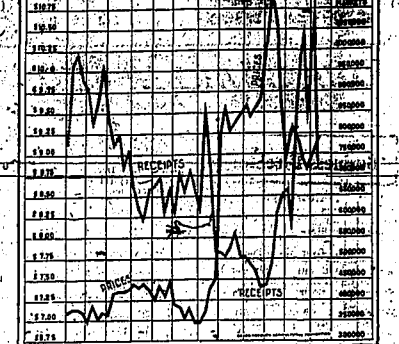
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HOW THE HOG MARKET BEHAVED IN 1924



Hogs have played a leading role in an unusual livestock market during 1924. The present crop of production is just emerging from the stage of over-killings and low prices and is headed toward a period of underproduction and high prices, according to the Stock Raiser's Association.

The hog market in 1924 has been characterized by a sharp decline in prices from a peak of \$14.00 per hundred weight in July to a low of \$7.00 in December.

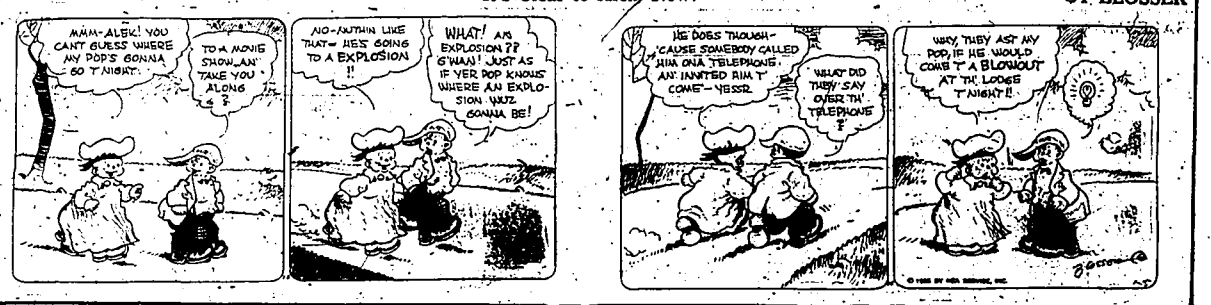
The domestic demand for hog products has been strong, however, and prices have risen well through the recent months, averaging from \$10.00 to \$12.00 per hundred weight.

The fall of 1924 is the late summer of 1924, while the 1923 pig crop was going to market. The average price for hogs at Chicago was \$11.00. In view of the prospects for a greatly reduced pig crop in 1925, an average of around \$11 for hogs at Chicago is well within the bounds of reason for marketing from the fall of 1924 to September, 1925.
