

**SLEMP QUITS ON WARGO 4. FEUD OCCURS**

President's Secretary to Re-sign; Relations Between Him and Executive Not Smooth. Expected Position in Cabinet.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 15.—C. Bascom Slemp of Virginia has resigned as secretary to cabinet Coolidge, and Representative Edward W. Wargo of Indiana has been chosen as his successor.

Official confirmation of the change was given at the White House office by person close to the president, but Slemp personally refused any statement and no statement on behalf of the president was made.

Washington, Jan. 15.—C. Bascom Slemp, secretary of President Coolidge, will resign today. It was a short time ago that he was appointed to the position.

Slemp refused either to confirm or deny the statement personally until he has had a chance to confer with the president.

Slemp may accept some official or diplomatic appointment upon retirement from the White House.

Slemp is wealthy and at no time was there any conviction that he intended to remain long as Mr. Coolidge's secretary.

It is thought that when President Coolidge is asked to appoint a cabinet member, the name of Slemp will be mentioned.

Relations between Slemp and the president have not been as harmonious as they were at first.

It is believed that Slemp has been a member of the cabinet for some time, but he has not been confirmed.

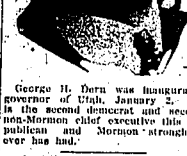

**Palatial Murdock Home to Serve As New Headquarters**

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Jan. 15.—Stately halls and spacious drawing rooms, well appointed with the latest and most magnificent of modern appointments, will be the new headquarters of the Typographical Union, which will be located in the palatial Murdock home on the fashionable North Merion street district, will become headquarters of the International Typographical Union, April 1.

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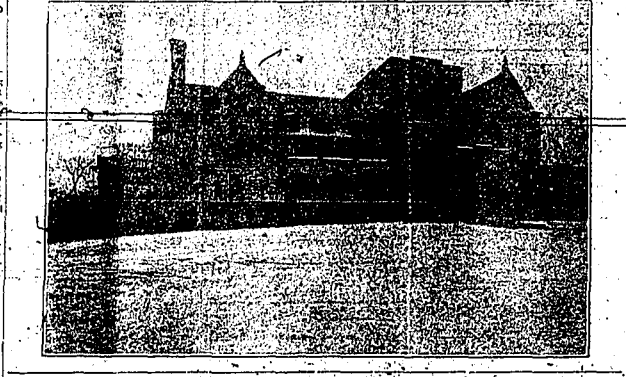
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View of the new headquarters of the Typographical Union, located in the palatial Murdock home on North Merion street, Indianapolis.

## KEEPING WELL

**WHY NOT HAVE CHEERFUL ROOMS?**

DR. FREDERICK H. GREEN

MOST of us think of health as simply the absence of disease. This is only the negative side. It is health in much more than not being sick.

Health in its broadest sense means perfect harmony between the individual and his surroundings.

Few of us realize that everything with which we come in contact has a more or less marked effect on our body and our mind.

At first thought there would seem to be little connection between interior decoration and health, but the surroundings in which we live and work have much influence, favorable or unfavorable, on our mental and bodily condition.

Too little attention has been paid to the importance of cheerful and healthful workrooms, offices and living rooms.

Unpainted walls, whether of plaster or of wood, absorb moisture and are consequently a breeding place for various kinds of germs. If the walls are papered, the paper, fitted, together with the paste, furnishes an additional breeding place for germs and a lodging place for dust.

Cold water paints, that is paints which are dissolved in cold water, such as emulsion, whitewash, etc., are not durable and badly painted with them cannot be washed.

The best thing is a good oil paint, which on drying, forms a hard, smooth, nonabsorbent surface, which can be easily cleaned.

Color is also important.

Dark greens and blues in a wall coating absorb much light; consequently, a greater amount of illumination is needed for such rooms. Yellow, buff, light tans and grays do not absorb so much light. On the contrary, they reflect it, and, consequently, increase the light in the room.

The colors in which a room is decorated affect the mental conditions of its occupants. Greens and blues are depressing, while yellows and tans are stimulating. You are happier, more cheerful and more energetic in a room that is light, airy, spacious and clean than you are in a room that is dark and stuffy.

The rooms in which you are going to live and work might just as well be pleasant and cheerful as disagreeable and uncomfortable. Other things being equal, the happier you are, the healthier you will be and the better able to resist disease.

"There is never any need of rushing—rushing—it is better to take a little time to find out the character of the securities offered and of the person offering them. The buying of securities was greatly stimulated by the Liberty Loans." Uncle Sam offered Liberty Bonds only about 300,000 people in the United States owned securities. Now millions of people are buying stocks and bonds.

"Of course the newspaper security vendors have taken advantage of the public's new education in investment. All sorts of bad and questionable securities are being offered for sale. Naturally the majority of the people are not rich, so when a man sets out to sell bonds or stocks through the country he is prepared to sell in small quantities. 'Baby bonds,' \$100 bonds, that are popular. If the baby bonds are sold they are as good an investment as any. But before you buy bonds of any kind get good advice.

"Be especially careful about door-to-door salesmen. A bond house that floods the country with salesmen is out to great expense. They can't send salesmen all over the United States for nothing, so when a salesman comes to sell you bonds it is important to investigate the quality of the bond he is selling. Your bank will give information about investment houses and investments, and if you follow the bank's advice you will not lose your money.

"Another thing to be looked upon with suspicion," continued Aunt Emmy, "is the man who tries to sell you securities over the telephone. Such men will call up some woman living in the country and say they are calling the attention of a friend.

## ADVOCATE SEED CORN TEST

The Iowa Bankers' Association sent out a bulletin to its members urging the bankers to have the farmer test his seed corn this year because of the heavy damage done to corn last year by dry weather. Enclosed was a letter from a farm professor man at Iowa State College explaining the situation. Germination tests on 33,000 ears of representative seed corn from all sections of the state showed that only about 50 per cent were fit for seed purposes, the rest being either weak or dead. "Dry rot is very prevalent in the seed corn this year and is responsible for the low vitality of a good deal of seed corn. In a great many cases ears may look bright and free from disease but kernels from these ears will show the presence of dry rot when germinating in the test."

H. B. No. 12, by state affairs committee—Repealing chapter 161, laws of 1922, relating to the continuing application for the maintenance of the mineral fuel bill in the capitol.

H. B. No. 13, by state affairs committee—Amending section 129, Compiled Statutes by eliminating the annual continuing appropriation of \$150 for the state law library.

H. B. No. 14, by judiciary committee—Amending section 203, Compiled Statutes, by requiring that copies of each of supreme court decisions be delivered to the law library of the University of Idaho and six copies to the college of the law of the University of Washington, one copy which is now delivered to the institution.

H. C. R. No. 4, by H. C. R. Providing for the printing of 500 copies of the journal of the thirtieth session of the legislature and distributing 300 copies to the house and 200 to the senate.

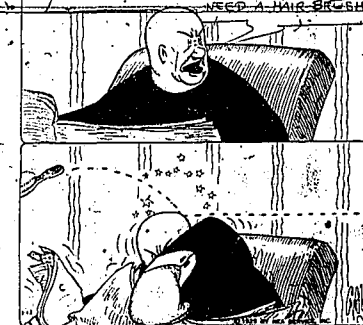

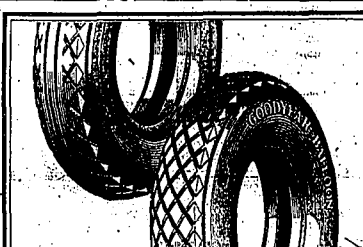
