One Faction Argues That Move Will Give Men of Wealth Control of Conventions; Only Three Lesser Measures Are Passed by Legislature

LOS FRIENDS, Texas, Jan. 21.—A running amuck with a machete after attacking a young girl and slaying her mother, insane Sandovall, was shot to death by Sheriff Sam Robertson today. Sheriff Robertson reported that the insane Sandovall, alleged to have been insane, attacked the girl in the outskirts of Los Friends, and then attempted to slay her mother with the machete.

DOHSE, Idaho, Jan. 21.—By a vote of 21 to 17 the house of the eighteenth Idaho legislature Thursday morning passed the bill ending the payment of traveling expenses to delegates attending party conventions.

Party lines were erased when the vote was taken. Arguments that the more would give men of wealth control of conventions came from both sides of the chamber, as did their arguments that the appropriation for the purpose, as now provided, is insufficient and really does not pay the traveling expenses of more than a few delegates.

One, by Senator E. H. Kirkpatrick, of Minidoka, would repeal the entire public utilities law, commission and all. One by Senator D. J. Lea of Caribou, would place heavy taxes on better substitutes—\$1000 on manufacturers, \$400 on wholesalers, \$50 on retailers and \$25 on hotels and eating houses handling substitutes.
