

LONG-DELAYED FORESTRY BILL IS PRESENTED

Measure Creating Office of State Forester Introduced in Legislature Today. Salary of Office Would Be \$3,000 a Year.

BOISE, Idaho, Jan. 22.—The much heralded forestry bill, inaugurating a new administration policy of timber and watershed conservation, was introduced in the Idaho legislature today in a forestry committee bill.

It created the office of state forest co-operative board, of which eight are state officials and four appointed by the governor on recommendation of timber owners.

An appropriation of \$100,000 is made to form the nucleus of the forester's fund, limits which will be fixed and penalties for violations of the act.

A forest protection fund was provided by the bill, to be used by timber owners to be used in fire protection work.

Elton of Cassia introduced a bill denouncing big game districts, exempting motor vehicles from registration fees.

W. O. Shoup, progressive, introduced a new bank guarantee fund bill at the same time that the retiree killed by Institute has passed a similar bill.

No bills were brought to final vote in the house, but two bills threatened with early death by refusal to print were saved.

One of these was W. O. Shoup's bill, introduced Wednesday making adultery the only ground by divorce.

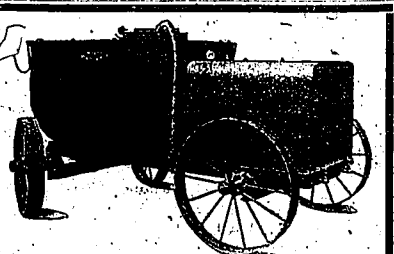

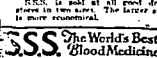

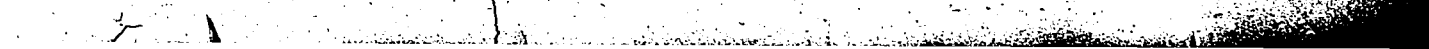

DOCTORS MAY NOT OPPOSE TAYLOR RULE

Belief is Expressed That Plan Adopted is Legal and Constitutional but Claim is Made That Room Would Be Little Used.

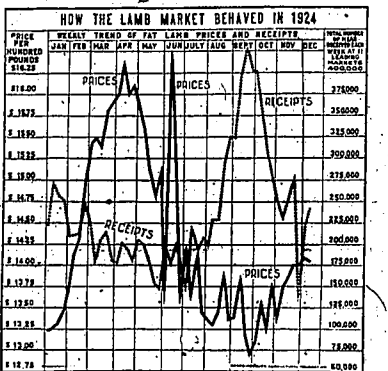

Sheep were prime favorites in the live stock market at the close of 1924. The year was a prosperous one for lamb producers, sheep selling higher and at a wider margin of profit than other classes of live stock, according to the year-end summary just compiled by the Santa Fe Stock Agricultural Foundation.

In 1924 the price for lamb averaged around \$14.20, an advance of 80 cents over 1923 and 1922, and an increase of \$4.45 over the low market of 1921, when a shipment of western wools on one of the central markets realized only 85 cents a head after paying marketing costs.

The reason for this advancing prosperity lies in the present high prices of wool, which have come back to a heavy figure over the previous average. Another strong contributing factor lies in the comparatively low production of the past few years. During 1924 the decreased population (which was lower in January, 1925 than at any time since 1923) had been increased to some extent, but had barely begun to restore its pull to the production level of pre-war years.

During the summer the movement of feeder lambs to the country was far ahead of last year, although a large total was recorded for 1924. The movement diminished later and the number of lambs on feed throughout the entire country shows a decrease of less than 1 per cent on a tally around the last few weeks of the year, while Colorado, a strong supply state for the lamb market after the first of February, shows an increase of 20,000 head over the 1923 figures.

This increase, however, will not insure the market receipts for some time, and relatively high prices are expected to continue through 1925 and probably for the next few years. The margin of profit in lamb production for 1924 has been large enough that no decline in the market will tend to wipe it out well over in the near future, the Foundation states. Sheepmen are in for a period of continuing prosperity for some time to come.

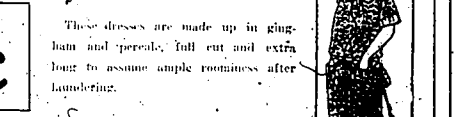
