SCHOOL POLL SHOWS MORE PEOPLE HERE

Large Increase in Grades Over Last Year, According to Estimates Compiled Today; High and Junior High Have Many More Students; System Working Smoothly. There are about 110 more students in the high and junior high schools this semester over last, including 70 who came in from the grades. It was stated today by Superintendent Ernest D. Bloom. The extra 40 are from the outside, that is, from families that have moved in.

The removal from the grades of 70 has been followed by a systematic reorganization which has relieved the congested rooms in the Lincoln and Bickel schools and enabled the whole work to go forward nicely. Figures for the first six grades show that 100 more than last year pupils have moved into the districts from the outside. Approximately half as many have moved out.
