

Oregon started with a 2-cent gas tax, raised it to three, and now is proposing to increase it to six cents a gallon, in the coming session of the legislature, on the theory that by so doing, automobile licenses can be reduced and the heaviest tax load placed on those who use the road the most. California adopted a 2-cent gasoline tax two years ago and reduced the license fee to a flat price of \$3. Now it is proposed to increase the gas tax to three or four cents a gallon and the license tax to \$5 on all motor cars. Gasoline and motor car taxes have spread like wild fire over the nation. Tax gatherers have found it easier to raise money from this source than from any other.
