The injustice of taking a doctor's report on his patients while ill as indicating the average health of all the citizens of a community would be obvious enough.

The Fact Finders found plenty of mistakes. Mistakes have been made in every state in the United States since the first colonies settled on the Atlantic coast.

Two cases of failures are dwelt on especially in the Garrett article: One of these is the Skoshone project, where a government report in 1909 spoke of 60 bushels of wheat per acre and 400 bushels of potatoes.
