

REJECTION OF CHILD LABOR AMENDMENT ON COAST EXPECTED

Majority of Pacific States Will Probably Turn Down Provision; California Ratifies the Amendment; Issue Still Alive in Oregon and Nevada.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Jan. 29.—Defeat of the national child labor amendment in the majority of the Pacific coast states seemed probable today on the face of actions and indications thus far.

CROWDS FLOCK TO COURTROOM TO HEAR TRIAL

Lincoln Murder Case Attracting Throngs at Geneva, Illinois.

GENEVA, Ill., Jan. 29.—Crowds were again fighting to gain entrance to the courtroom of Judge William Patton early today, following sensational disclosures in the trial of Warren J. Lincoln, Aurora florist-laborer, the murderer of his wife, Lena Shoup Lincoln, and her brother, Byron Shoup.

In yesterday's late testimony, it was revealed for the first time that John Lincoln, son of the mail order store, had covered the windows of the greenhouse with a certain amount of light from the furnace.

The sensational testimony was a continuation of a year old trial, which has never before been made public. Bruce Albert, assistant prosecuting attorney, who was present during the confession, was made testified to its accuracy.

The confession, the fifth of the series to go before the jury, revealed that it had taken Lincoln two nights to dispose of the bodies, and that he had used a saw to cut the bodies into pieces, and then to burn them in a cement, making a concrete block.

FROM DISHWASHER TO PRESIDENT IS RECORD OF YOUTH

CHICAGO, Jan. 29.—From a dishwasher and "hash shaver" in a south State street restaurant to the presidency of a dining of 100 restaurants in less than two years is the climb made by John R. Thompson, who yesterday assumed control of the 610,000 restaurant chain—built by his father. For this he holds the title of a rich boy who made good.

Young Thompson, barely past 30, began learning the business by taking his first job as a dishwasher in one of his father's restaurants.

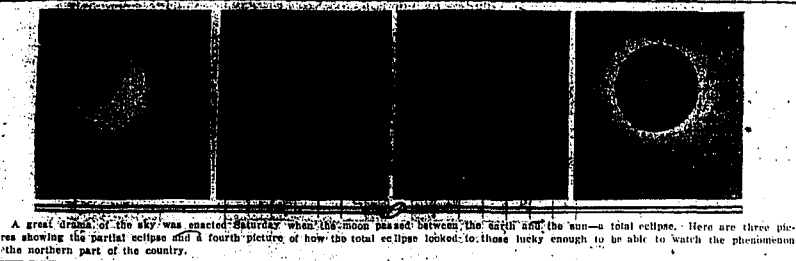

SEEK TO ERASE NET IS SPREAD FOR KIDNAPERS

Would Prevent Murderer From Being Acquitted on Insanity Plea and Then Being Freed.

BOISE, Jan. 29.—Idaho is moving to erase that strange provision of its law under which a murderer may be acquitted on a plea of insanity and then freed of that charge.

Former Chief Justice Charles P. McCarthy is drafting for a legislative committee an judiciary bill for that purpose to be introduced immediately and its passage will be a matter of days, in the opinion of the members of this committee.

Last April Vern L. Taylor, of Mountain Home shot to death Dan McLaughlin, a fellow citizen and fellow member of the bar. There was widespread belief among friends of both men that Taylor was clearly insane. The prosecuting attorney thought so and asked for an insanity commission.

But Judge B. S. Varian called in from the seventh district, directed a murder trial under section 5005 of the compiled statutes. The jury held Taylor irresponsible because of insanity, and the judge directed a new jury to be called.

BURDEN OF DELEGATE EXPENSE LIFTED FROM STATE SHOULDERS

ONE DEAD FROM POISONED FOOD

WINDSOR, Ont., Jan. 29.—One member of a family is dead and three others are believed dying in a hospital today from effects of eating canned vegetables.

The dead man is Joseph Campau, 45. The dying: Mrs. Campau, Joseph, 16, and Jean, Jr., 8.

Neighbors passing the home investigated reports that the family had found Campau dead, lying sprawled on the floor, his wife and two sons were taken to a hospital. The baby girl was the only member of the family to escape poisoning. Partially empty cans of vegetables were taken by the coroner for investigation.

GOODING BILL ENDORSED BY HOUSE TODAY

Lower Body Suspends the Rule and Passes Vigorous Endorsement of Long and Short Haul Measure of Senator.

BOISE, Jan. 29.—Just before adjournment today the house suspended the rule and passed a vigorous endorsement of the Gooding long and short haul measure by a vote of 25 to 10.

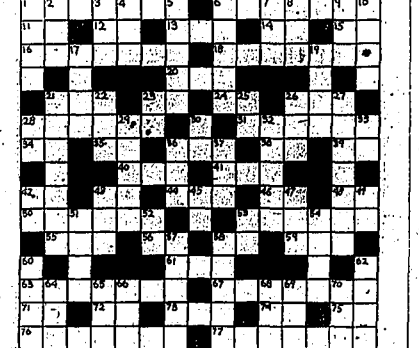

# GLENN YOUNG, KLAN LEADER LAID TO REST

### Final Tribute Paid to Dead Crusader; Multitude Turns Out at Herrin; Services Are Simple But Impressive.

HERRIN, Ill., Jan. 22.—Southern Illinois turned out its multitude this afternoon to pay final tribute to the guerrilla-like klan and fire crusader, S. Glenn Young.

Between 20,000 and 30,000 persons manned the Baptist church and the streets by which the final procession marched to pay honor to a man who dropped in a death duel the other night on the bloody "hat-war" of "bloody Williamson county."

As early as midnight last night the town was filled with friends of Young or members of his order, the Ku Klux Klan.

Multitude of women brushed shoulders with the poorer class men who stood about in front of the modestly dressed men workers of this section.

At 1:30 a. m. the Baptist church where Young's body has been lying in state since Sunday night, was thronged as guards of honor, was filled.

The klan made good its boast of a multitude to pay worship at the feet of the fallen leader. Klansmen from Missouri, Illinois and Kentucky were represented.

Services in the church were simple. Rev. J. E. Leo and Rev. P. R. Cloutier, presided the work of the funeral. The funeral was a special musical program. After that relatives were allowed for the last time to view Young's body.

The great tribute to Young, started then. The final procession moved off across town, down through the streets where Young was known and feared and past the city hall, the building and grounds decorated with American flags. Those on out of town, across the hills, snow-covered hills of the little village, country, where already the body of Dr. Thomas—suitor of the victim—of Saturday night's outcropping of hate—lies buried.
