## Would-Be Champions Given Severe Panning

**NEW YORK, Jan. 29.**—Somewhere around in the country, riding bareback, a powerful black and gray gelding, champion of the world, Jimmy DeForest, the champion of the world, is being trained by the discoverer of that amazing champion, the famous trainer, Jack Dempsey.  
 Since it was discovered that the camp of Jack Dempsey within a few hours after the ponderous, sea-winded, and unsteady "heavy" weight champion of the world, DeForest, has been training of another discovery. He backed up his dreams with a lot of energetic work that has ended almost in despair.

"There never will be another Dempsey," Jimmy said recently. "Dempsey was a novice when I started to work with him. He had a fighting heart, a great pair of eyes and a powerful back, and good action in his legs. He had to be taught to perfect all the natural advantages with which he was endowed. He never would have become the champion of the world and one of the greatest of all champions, however, if he hadn't been willing to learn."

"Dempsey always acted the part of a pupil who knew nothing," and he treated me like I was the smartest fellow in the world. He never offered an argument. When I told him to do something, he did it without protest. He was so serious about it that I never had to tell him twice to do the same thing.  
 "When he came to me, Dempsey was ambitious, but I don't believe he figured that he could win the heavyweight title and become a millionaire. He had nothing to encourage him but the hope of becoming a better fighter than he was. I am a hard task master. I always insist that any one in my charge do just as I say and when I say it, I know that the routine of training is known and I know that Dempsey must have rebellions at times, but he said never one word.

"There are no Dempseys among the current crop of young heavyweights. In the last, four years must have looked at 600 heavyweights and I must have worked with 200. I didn't find a real prospect with the exception of Luis Firpo and he wouldn't stop with me."

title, thanks to her supremacy over other beauties at the Atlantic City contest this year, has been asked to make a tour of the country in 1925; and I personally guarantee that no one who hears her can fail to succumb to her charms. If she accepts, her mission will be to tell the world, or that important part of it known as the United States, all about Philadelphia, where the Sesqui-Centennial is to be held in 1926.

Here's the reason I am so confident in predicting that broken masculine hearts and dejected feminine noses will result from Miss Malcomson's Seeing America First jaunt: I myself have looked her over, with all the critical zeal of a woman at the possibility of finding a flaw in the beauty of another—and had to go away without the satisfaction of finding it!

However, there is also satisfaction in knowing that there is such a thing as flawless feminine beauty. That satisfaction was mine. She is without blemish or imperfection, quite! She is absolutely flawless! She is, if I may descend into the vernacular, an eye-fall!

It seems absurd to dwell on such sophisticated things as "beauty secrets" in connection with a young girl so fresh and naive as Miss Malcomson. But she is nevertheless certain beauty secrets—the secret of her own success. Here is no cream-coated, artificially beauteous; here is no artificial support—here is nature's own loveliness.

There are other external cosmetics and internal stimulants to bring the beauteous color of flame to the cheeks; neither, you might say, stimulates nor stimulates.

Miss Malcomson is not in sympathy with the flapper movement. She values her individuality too much for that. She does not depend on her hair as if it came from one mold—same make-up, same hair-cut, same styled-to-good-beauty; but she must ever induce—wonderment and a delicious trouble, longing and love, and a trembling—something more than symmetry and symmetry owes its beauty to a remoter principle—its affinity with the

other aspects to her beauty besides the physical; the mental and spiritual aspects. She is no mere shallow girl. She likes Thomas Meighan, for instance, among the movie stars, because, she says, he has depth and manliness. Similarly, in real life, the man who measures up to her ideal need not be handsome, but he must be sincere and worth-while. And she has an especial liking for the wholesome, out-of-door type of chap. She has her own athletic abilities include swimming, baseball, the high jump and horseshoe riding, it is natural that she admires the man who goes in for sports. And it may be mentioned here that Miss Malcomson has a host of suitors and admirers.

She admits, however, that she doesn't know any one in the least like this ideal man she has visioned in her imagination.

Miss Malcomson sings in a church choir, too, and her interest in her church has not waned the slightest bit since she has had so many honors to absorb her attention. Her mother believes that religious training is the very basis of her daughter's beauty, she says, for it has given her the peace and security which make for that most valuable of woman's possessions—poise.

The 1924 Miss America does not think that any girl can be transformed into a beauty overnight, and she does not endorse any get-beautiful-quick schemes. The end, she thinks, is to be achieved only by daily right living. Certainly, beauty is no overnight thing to Miss Malcomson. She inherited her beauty from her mother. She was a beautiful baby. She was a beautiful child. And now she is a beautiful young woman, America's acknowledged loveliest.

Beautiful babies, of course, when "beauty" can be "conferred" only by the laws of heredity. But, beautiful "big babies," beautiful girls and beautiful young women, are not to be

unless, in addition to happy heredity, they have the right care from babyhood on. Miss Malcomson, in a graceful gesture giving the credit for her own attractiveness to her mother, says she was had this meticulous care.

Although anyone who observes the good looks of Ruth's mother, as well as the undeveloped prettiness of a younger sister, cannot believe that the laws of heredity had a great deal to do with the new "Miss America's" perfection, yet it is also impossible not to be impressed with Mrs. Malcomson's strict regime for bringing up babies to be beauties. Mrs. Malcomson, in fact, admits that she realized, almost from the time of her famous daughter's birth, that she had a beauty on her hands. Naturally, she says, she took every sensible precaution to preserve that beauty. These precautions are the same ones to which America's beauty queen, even to this day, faithfully keeps herself; but she maintains that all her present-day beautifying activities are not more valuable than the care her mother gave her, when she was still a baby girl, along the homeward trail.

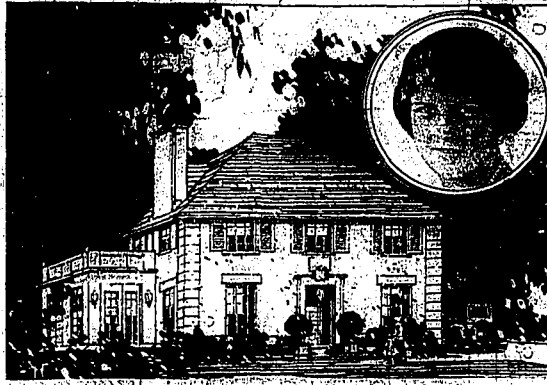

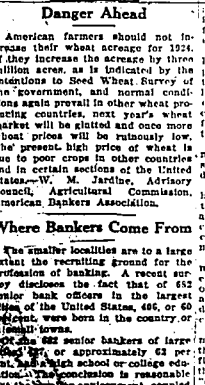

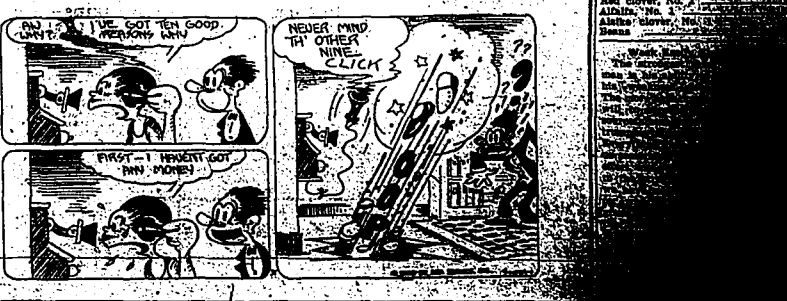
