STUDENTS ARE POISONED BY CRANKS DOPE

Conspiracy Evolved at Free Dispensary of Ohio State University Causes Death of Two Students and Sickness of Many Others.

COLUMBUS, O., Feb. 4.—A doctor who worked with medicines at the free dispensary at Ohio State University, probably by some "cranks," was the direct cause of the death of two students and the serious illness of several others here this week.

The doctor, whose name is not given, was admitted to the Ohio University School of Medicine. He declared that he had made no mistakes in his treatment.

He died Saturday night.

It was learned that suspicion was directed against Dr. Campbell, who has been here for but six months.

He was dismissed from his position.

He was accused of being a "cruel" physician.

General Forbes Gets Two Years in Pen Scored by Judge

**Girl's Confession
of Murder Causes
Doubt by Specialists**

CHICAGO, Feb. 4.—Sentences of two years in the federal penitentiary and \$10,000 fine each were imposed here today on Collier and Thompson, former members of the veterans bureau, and John W. Thompson, St. Louis contractor, for conspiracy to bribe the government in connection with hospitalization contracts.

Federal Judge Carpenter rejected the motion for a new trial.

The sentences are the extreme penalty provided by law.

A stay of sentence or 30 days was granted to allow Thompson to carry an appeal to the circuit court of appeals.

In passing sentence Carpenter said:

were found guilty of conspiracy."

RELIGIOUS MEETING DISTURBED HERE

The young men who were convicted Monday before Judge James L. Mee of disturbing a religious meeting and who elected to serve two and a half days in jail in lieu of paying \$5 each in fine and costs, may have had a lot of fun while "doing time," but it will be well with them if they realize that it is a warning to them. Religious worship is a serious matter with the worshippers. Nobody compels anyone to attend religious services, so those whose levity tempt them to laugh at something which they think peculiar do not have to go to public worship. Disturbance of a religious meeting is a violation of ordinance. Disturbance of a religious meeting is also an offense against the laws of Idaho, which provide that "Every person who wilfully disturbs or disquiets any assemblage of people met for religious worship, by noise, profane discourse, rude or indecent behavior, or by any unnecessary noise, either within the place where such meeting is held, or so near as to disturb the order and solemnity of the meeting is guilty of a misdemeanor." For this a fine of not less than \$5 nor more than \$500 may be imposed on conviction.

ONCE A SCOUT, ALWAYS A SCOUT

"Good things generally come in two's," is an old adage.

In this case, the good things are the Boy Scouts of America, and the 2,000,000 boys who have been engrossed in its ranks.

Next week the Boy Scouts will celebrate the fifteenth anniversary of the founding of their Movement in this country. The slogan of the week is, "Once a Scout, Always a Scout," the predominating motive, to renew the comradeship between these 2,000,000 young men and the Movement.

Not the least impressive of the nation-wide ceremonies of the week will occur February 8th, when the entire huge membership, standing at attention, will renew allegiance to the principles of the Scout Oath and Law.

From the business and professional worlds, from the fields of church, school and state the 2,000,000 formerly active comrades have been coming to join the ranks. Scout manhood is greeting Scout boyhood—a union hard to excel.

As a result these Scout men are going to carry back anew into 2,000,000 organizations and institutions, stores and offices, the fresh joyous spirit of Scouting and its love for fellowmen.

But a vaster result can be expected. These young men with renewed consciousness of the advantages they have received from Scouting are going to feel a deepened sense of obligation in passing on to other boys the good things that older men have given them. An increase in volunteer leaders will come about.

This will mean help and more help in solving Scouting's greatest problem—the question of sufficient leadership.

Today in the United States there are 8,000,000 boys of Scout age not yet in the ranks of Scouting. Nine-tenths of these boys ardently desire to be scouts but are denied this opportunity because of lack of leadership. More scouts mean more boys influenced at the most critical period of their lives, toward the ideals of manhood that America needs.

If 2,000,000 formerly active Boy Scouts take upon themselves the duties and responsibilities of Scout leadership, inestimable will be the results to our nation in good citizenship, democracy and true Americanism.
