Recent actions of the commission indicate that a tournament plan may be attempted to decide the contender that will meet Dempsey in his next fight for his successor if he should retire.

The news has been broadcasted to the effect that one of our attorneys is going to California. All we have to say is that California is hard up for an attorney.

This is Boy Scout week and Twin Falls will stage a celebration tonight in honor of this event. Scouting has done much for our boys right here in the Magic City and the movement is just getting started. The real results, both at home and throughout the nation, will be reflected in future generations. If these results are to be figured on a mathematical basis then a comparison of future delinquency with present day delinquency will be the measuring rod of whether the scout movement is worth while.

When the state legislature of Idaho killed the bill for giving publicity to the Gem State it defeated our greatest means of bringing new capital to this state and developing our resources as they should be developed. Our large tracts should be divided up into smaller ones and intensive farming carried on. If this is done we can furnish farms for the population we now have. In the second place, we have much arid land which can be brought under cultivation by irrigation but the stupidity of our legislators will not permit them to see this great opportunity.

The merchants of Twin Falls will meet tonight for a general get-together and banquet. Such meetings are commendable and should bring forth a better feeling and more co-operation, which is essential to the growth and progress of any city. It is a good thing for business and professional men to sit down together and look each other in the eye and exchange greetings. Even a devil isn't near so fiendish when you get him fed up pretty well, and if you can persuade him to sing a bit it will have a wonderful transforming effect on his spirits. The public at large are invited to this banquet regardless of membership in the Chamber of Commerce.

TWIN FALLS IS A GOOD PLACE FOR THE IDAHO AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE

While there is considerable discussion at this time about the proposed move of the State Agricultural College from Moscow to Pocatello, better arguments can be advanced for the movement of this institution to the Twin Falls tract. We might go on at quite a lengthy appeal as to why this school should be located in Southern Idaho, but people might get just about as tired of reading this dope as they do those arguments presented by the Gate City. We have everything that Pocatello has and a lot more, so legislators should think about Twin Falls when they get ready to move this state institution.

Here is an editorial from the Idaho Statesman which sets forth some facts along this line which should be read by everyone:

It is hard to get enthused over the prospect of moving the state agricultural school from Moscow to Pocatello.

The arguments in favor of it are good enough to deserve weighing, however. There is the very old argument that a state which depends upon irrigation for its agricultural prosperity should not tuck its school of farming away in the rolling hills of a rainfall area. It would be good judgment to place such a school in the center of the Snake River valley, which will one day be recognized as the greatest producing valley in the west.

And there is also the argument of relief for the university itself. For years now, the university people have been spreading a propaganda of inadequacy. They have said the institution is neither big enough for its growing student body nor can it give all the courses they demand. The idea has permeated the whole establishment. Every teacher, every student guide, every Moscow booster, when showing off the university to a visitor, has pointed out not merely the attractive features, but the need of repairs, the crowding, the lack of facilities. It was hoped that this would eventually bring appropriations to relieve the situation.

Now the propaganda of the university people is turning upon them. Pocatello says to Moscow: "Here's a capital idea. Let's have the agriculture work away to the south, where it belongs; then the rest of the university can have a breathing spell and do some stretching."

There is merit to the argument, but, of course, the plan prevents the building of a great university in Idaho, and Idaho has a hankering for a great university. It destroys a lot of worth-while property that cannot be moved from north to south and is useless at Moscow unless agriculture is taught there. There is always loss and waste when one moves; any housewife, who has gone through several spasms of moving can understand that.

But there is a better reason why this particular project should not go through. Much as Pocatello may be an up-and-coming city, much as her people may deserve state "pork" hard as her Republican politicians may have labored in the last campaign, the fact remains that Pocatello is not the place for a farm school in south Idaho. For a trades school there is no better location than Pocatello, and if ever Idaho grows big enough to justify more than one state college, her school of technology might go there. The place for a farm school in south Idaho is in the vicinity of Blackfoot and Idaho Falls, or in the vicinity of Twin Falls, Piler and Buhl, or in the Boise valley. That is why it is hard to get enthused over this Pocatello proposition.

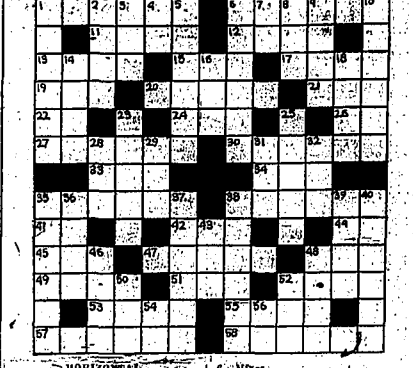
