WASHINGTON, Feb. 19.—President Coolidge will issue an invitation for the second Washington arms conference as soon as approval of the French government is assured, Great Britain and Japan having already given informal expressions of approval.

Although France blocked invitation for auxiliary naval craft at the Paris conference, which is the primary object of the proposed conference, informal discussions now in progress between Ambassador Horlick and Premier Herriot in Paris gave hope in official circles here today.

France may withhold a definite affirmative answer, it is believed, until the creation of a national arms conference, which also sponsored in Brussels, postponed. This proposal is being discussed by British delegates at the coming League council meeting, but is put off until the September meeting of the League.

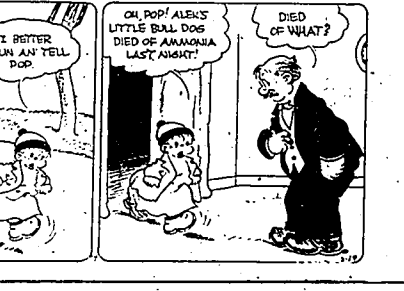

BUHL-BEE-MAN GIVES OPINION ON INSPECTION

(Public Forum Article).
The writer would like to know how many people on the Twin Falls tract know how bee inspection is manipulated. Here in Buhl I short time ago a number of cards were sent to bee keepers stating there was to be a meeting of beekeepers January 23-24.

This is one of the mistakes that beekeepers make, to call a meeting for January 23-24, when in fact they had called this same meeting January 2, 1925.

However, a few bee men met in Dr. Peters' office room on the second floor of the Odd Fellows building.

Please remember that the most of the men that attended this meeting were never known to produce a large crop of honey per hive. The most of the heavy producers in this area take no interest in these meetings.

Since Mr. Gleen wanted the job of bee inspector, and since there was no other person that was offered a job the wish was granted. Please remember that the writer has been informed that Mr. Gleen is the inspector, extracted from his bees last summer 600 pounds of honey while the writer extracted from an average number of hives, of about 600 pounds of honey.

I hope this will explain why this little bunch of would-be bee-keepers use such little intelligence among other things as selecting Mr. Gleen as bee inspector and president of their short coming.

I insist that we appoint a few men to inspect the bee inspector's bees, in the spring before the inspector expects other peoples bees. This would protect your hives from any possible infection from the inspector's bees.

This infuriated the inspector much the same as when you have a red herring in front of an offender.

The inspector jumped up, yelling and swearing and wanted to whip the writer who produced more honey per few good and reasonable suggestions.

Was the bee inspector afraid if his bees were inspected by a few men he would be brought to light? I immediately left the room while the swearing continued. The inspector would require a temperature in the beehive of from 90 to 100 degrees for bees to be healthy.

Last May the bee inspector brought five men to my beehive to inspect my bees on the Twin Falls tract. The names of the men I had in May. You can now arrive at some idea as to the damage they did me. I am hard on my bees. All five men say they did not find a cell of foul brood. The names of the men I will furnish on request.

In 1923 I produced 10,000 pounds of honey from only 200 hives. The bee inspector extracted in 1924 600 pounds. From many more hives than I had produced. The names of the men I will furnish on request.

Mr. Gleen said at the meeting that he did not want to be a bee inspector. He said that it was not necessary to inspect diseased bees before leaving that yard and entering another. In fact, I don't know a bee inspector on the Twin Falls tract that disregards the law in this respect.

Mr. Gleen has been doing every good thing that he can do to help the beekeepers. He has been inspecting diseased bees, before leaving the premises and proceeding to another apiary where he is not his own and his assistants' clothing. Any inspector who fails to comply with this section shall be considered from service, upon proof of such delinquency being filed with the department of agriculture. He shall forfeit all fees earned as inspector and shall forever be barred. From reappointment.

A beekeeper person will not take disease from exposure to the bees. The writer has been inspected by the inspector, steps in some foul brood, says to his bees, "confer with me, what happens? The bees crawl over or fly up to the substance, and the parasites in the bees and multiple parasites and when the old bees fly, the young bees take the parasites and transfer them to their own bees. You should disinfect the person and clothing which is suspected your bees. The law is very strict on this subject.

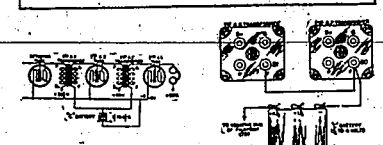

USING A "C" BATTERY WITH YOUR RADIO RECEIVER

In connection with radio receiver and audio frequency amplifier circuits it is possible, although not absolutely necessary, to use a so-called "C" battery. This is true in particular if a 1 or higher ratio audio frequency transformer is used and if not more than 50 volts are used on the plates of the amplifier tubes. The use of such a "C" battery, usually having a voltage of from 1/2 to 1 volt, has several advantages. It reduces battery current consumption and may possibly increase the clarity and volume of the signals. The two diagrams illustrate the picture and schematic connection of a "C" battery. In the first diagram, a frequency amplifier circuit of a radio receiver using a "C" battery is shown. With some types of radio receiver and amplifier circuits, a "C" battery may be used in connection with the audio transformer, with the number of turns of the primary winding of the secondary being chosen so that the secondary voltage shall be about 50 volts. This may be accomplished by passing through two stages of a radio receiver two "C" batteries. 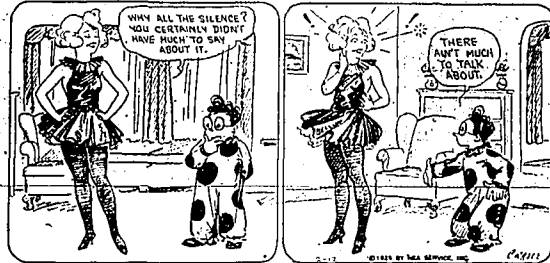
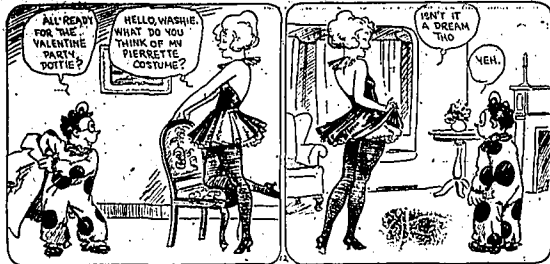

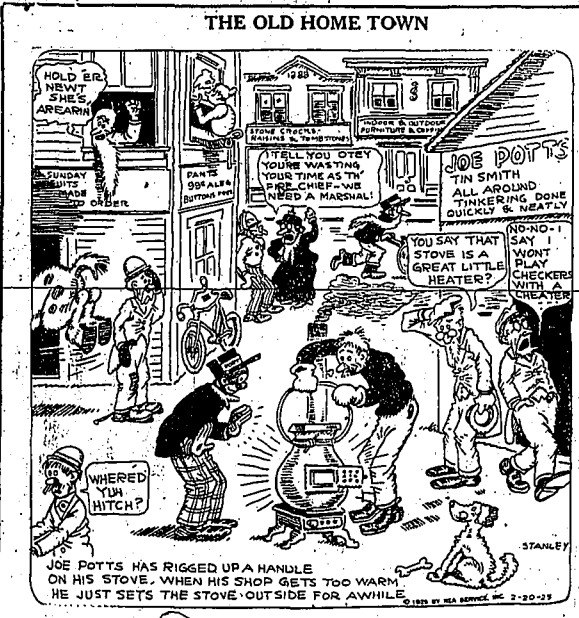
