

SLAYER SHOT IN UTAH PENITENTIARY AT SUNRISE

George Allen Pays Supreme Penalty for Murder of Salt Lake City Policeman Three Years Ago; In a Signed Statement Admits Awful Crime.

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, Feb. 20.—Henry C. Holt, alias George Allen, paid the death penalty at the Utah state prison this morning for the murder of Police Sergeant N. P. Pierce in this city nearly three years ago.

Holt was executed by a firing squad at 7:46, the official time for such a case being 7:30 a. m. The execution was witnessed by a "newsman." Holt went to his death calmly and without demonstration of any kind.

Sergeant Pierce was shot when he and a fellow officer encountered two men on lower Main street in the morning and asked them what their business was. One of the men replied that he was one of the officers' business and fired, wounding the sergeant in the stomach. Holt was arrested on March 37, 1922, and lodged until March 30, 1922, before he died.

WHAT WOULD HAPPEN IF—

Suppose the protocol of mutual assistance were now in force.

Greece and Turkey have a difference. Turkey has expelled the Greek patriarch and archbishops, which act Greece claims is contrary to the treaty of Lausanne.

Turkey denies it, and refuses arbitration.

Under the protocol, Greece would demand either arbitration or trial before the world court, if that body decided it had jurisdiction.

Turkey would either accept one of these methods or be declared the "aggressor" in any war that might result, even if Greece struck the first blow.

If there was arbitration and it went against Greece, on the ground that the expulsions were within Turkey's sovereign rights, Greece would accept the verdict, under the same penalties.

The chances are a thousand to one that no war would result, in either of these events.

In the thousandth case, the "aggressor" would be boycotted by everybody at once.

Such nations as chose to go further would consult as to steps against the aggressor.

Nobody could take steps in its favor without risking the same consequences. The war would be decisive, would hurt only the offender, and would not disrupt the rest of the world.

America's obligation would be confined to a peaceful boycott.

HEART DISEASE TAKES MORE THAN T. E.

"Heart disease has supplanted tuberculosis as the great man-killer."

This assertion was made by Dr. Robert H. Halsey of New York, in a paper presented to the American Association for the Advancement of Science at its last annual meeting in Washington, D. C.

This assertion was made by Dr. Stewart R. Roberts in a paper recently read before the Southern Medical Association in New Orleans, and by figures just given out for the year 1923 by the United States Department of Commerce.

Dr. Stewart asserted that there was no more excuse for having syphilis than leprosy; and that while a great portion of all heart diseases come from syphilis, the other portion comes from degeneration and afflictions of the rheumatic group, most of which, like syphilis, are entirely preventable.

Both Dr. Halsey and Dr. Stewart advocated a wider dissemination of knowledge to dispel the ignorance from which nearly all diseases that lead to heart trouble are born.

Caring for "Cut Flowers." It is interesting experiments have been made in the school of agriculture in promoting the lives of cut flowers. One hundred different flowers were employed in the experiments, and it was found that sugar helped to keep most of them fresh, but not injurious to them and was not. It hastened the opening of roses and orchids, but did not affect tulips, dahlias or chrysanthemums. Experiments were made with small quantities of alcohol, ether, glycerin, alcohol, lime water and ammonia, and it was found that the flowers kept in sugar and water lived four times as long as they did in water alone.
