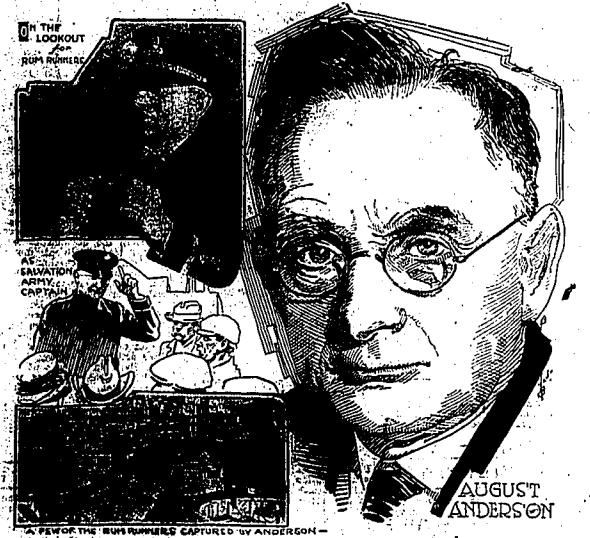

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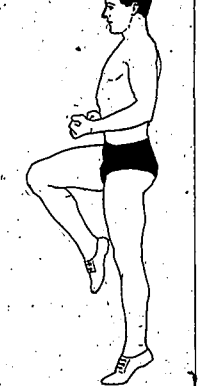

# Car Shortage Is to Be Averted Is Assurance Given

### Representatives of the Oregon Short Line and Pacific Fruit Express Are Confident That Even with Anticipated Big Crop Situation Will Be Met; Large Increase in Bean Crop, Dairy Products and Poultry Feature of Year.

That notwithstanding the prospect of bumper crops due to assurance of water supply adequate to furnish irrigation to all the tracts, the Union Pacific and the Pacific Fruit Express will be able to take care of the demand for cars during the coming season. The representatives of the horticultural meeting here by T. B. Krumrey, car service agent of the P. F. E., and C. L. Gunnell, superintendent of the P. F. E., thorough increase in dairy products, live poultry, and beans offered losses in other products this year and a great crop next year is anticipated and promised.

The speakers pointed out that the P. F. E. met all demands with practically no complaint and that last year's crop situation was handled easily with no complaints. The P. F. # AUTO CASE IS HEARD IN THE UPPER COURT

Appeal From Judgment Here Held in Right of Possession by Intervenor.

Hearing on the appeal of J. F. Lambert, intervener, was held in the appellate court Thursday in favor of E. E. Lind, relative to the ownership of a Dodge automobile, was held by the district court. Thursday with J. S. Sweely, of the firm of Sweely & Sweely, representing Lind, and J. F. Lambert, representing the contention of Lind as set forth by his attorney.

It was brought to a definite judgment on a promissory note given by the defendant to the plaintiff bearing date of May 7th, 1925. The consideration for the note was the purchase of a Dodge automobile.

The action was filed by an attachment issued upon the application of the plaintiff, Carl E. Lind, for a writ of habeas corpus to return a Dodge automobile. The defendant appeared by attorneys and filed a demurrer to the complaint. Thereafter the demurrer was withdrawn and the defendant refused to plead further. Judgment was entered against it for the amount due the plaintiff.

On June 10, 1925, J. F. Lambert filed his petition of intervention alleging that he was the owner of the Dodge automobile.

The automobile in controversy was also purchased from the Paycock Investment Company by the defendant in January, 1925, but not fully paid for at that time. The purchase price was \$1,000, the intervenor, Lambert, claiming to be the owner of the automobile in February, 1925. The exact date of his alleged purchase was not made certain by the testimony but it was in the month following its purchase by the investment company.

Before the purchase of the car by the intervenor, Lambert, he was used in his work, which was selling real estate on commission for the investment company. It is said during that time when it was kept at a garage. According to the testimony of the intervenor it was turned over to him at the office.

After it was turned over to the intervenor he kept it at the same place that it was when he got it, and used it as before.

The intervenor continued in the same work for the defendant up to September, 1925.

The state license for the car in controversy was taken out by the Paycock Investment company in the name of T. N. was before the intervenor made his purchase. Mr. Lind says the intervenor did not own the car at the time that he did not have the license transferred into his name after his alleged purchase.

The intervenor knew immediately after it was turned over to him that it was not his own property. He applied to the defendant, Paycock Investment company, for a release of the car. The company sought to secure its release by putting up a bond. The first bond offered was rejected. The company then submitted a second bond which was also refused. Mr. Lind claims that the intervenor knew of the submitting of these bonds by the defendant and did not take any steps to get possession of the car or the property claimed by him until June.
