The present flight of Puyi, as the emperor has generally been known since he was cast out of his palace in the summer of 1912, has been the beginning of his long and arduous journey.

IDAHO HOUSE DEFEATS BILL AGAINST JAPS

Bill Would Prohibit Japanese From Leasing Land in Idaho for More Than Five Years; Decried by Only One Vote; Salary Raise Defeated; Banking Bill Passes.

BOISE, Idaho, Feb. 24.—By a margin of one vote the lower house of the Idaho legislature today defeated a Japanese exclusion bill.

There was a house bill No. 255, by which A. H. Bentley of Moscow, who recently expressed his desire to amend the alien land leasing bill passed in 1923, which prohibits all aliens to lease for more than five years, by permitting, no lease after 1929 and the term shall not exceed more than 1929.

Arguments against the bill because of its tendency to complicate international relations and lavishly was made by Jones of Lewiston, Summers of Laramie, and Hall of Grange.

SCHOOL LEVY WILL CARRY BY MAJORITY IS PREDICTION

This prophecy proved incorrect in its last part, at least, since only five and five-eighths mills were levied of the total allowed. This fact has had much to do with the practical elimination of opposition this year.
