



The potential wealth of Twin Falls County and of Southern Idaho in general is far reaching and almost inestimable. Yet there is a great need for something else besides just what is here in potential worth at the present time. During the war when business was going at capacity and everybody was making money little attention was given to this question, but now this community is face to face with this paramount issue and must dispose of it in the proper fashion. There never was a better bunch of boosters than the folks who are living on the Twin Falls tract today, but every fellow is face to face with the stern reality that something besides boosting is needed here now.

There is a tendency when business drops to a low ebb for each fellow to begin to cuss the other fellow, but that will get us nowhere. There is that tendency here today in that everybody is cursing the Idaho Power and trying to blame this institution for all the ills of the community. This concern is not guiltless and its short-sighted policy will hurt the company in the end more than it will this community, because instead of inviting more capital to come in and invest with us, and instead of granting factory capital a low rate on power for building up such infant industries, the company is proceeding on the policy of get all you can today because tomorrow may never come. These mistakes are apparent to the average layman and yet the power company refuses to be moved from its position and thus it is placing at least one great barifer in the path of progress and development of the Twin Falls tract to its capacity.

But there is another and still another great fact which has been lost sight of continually in this community and that is that there are specialists in the world today who can perform superhuman feats in bringing industrics to a city or community which no one in that particular city could bring about. If we have overlooked a bet in loosting and bringing about new industries for this tract it is this one point, in our opinion. There are men who have special ability along this line and these men are specialists in their line. They know how to handle capital on the know what essentials are necessary to persuade capital to community and look it over and possibly invest at a later date. The paramount need of this community today is such a man. In other words

Can we point with pride to a single great cheese factory creeted in our city or within ten miles of it. Can we point to a single canning factory in our city or within ten miles of it today. Can we point to a woolen mill of any sort within ten miles of our city? Yet does any one dare to say that we have not an abundance of raw material to keep either of these three factories going day and night?

Will you, my fellow citizens, think this through with me and then let's meet and discuss this matter pub-licly and see if we cannot arrive at a conclusion which is more profitable than anything we have accomplished yet for the upbuilding of Twin Falls and South Idaho. We have here the nucleus of a wonderful little metropolis and if we will go out and get attyice and use it we can build here a city of twenty thousand in a few years.
