

MEXICO WILL BUILD ROADS BY GAS TAX

Co-operation of All Political Units Throughout the Republic Sought by President Calles in West Road Building Campaign; Gas to Be Taxed.

By A. W. FOLGER. One by one the Calles government is setting on the vital problems that confront the republic and presenting workable solutions that will bring prosperity to all classes.

Under the simple process of imposing a gas, consists not in the tax, the government is undertaking a road building program of wide scope.

Although there have been sporadic protests from the owners of automobiles over the project, it now is the sense of the majority of them that they will benefit ultimately along with the others.

Under the tentative program the tax will be levied by the federal government and the proceeds of the highway will be under the supervision of government engineers.

Inasmuch as the agrarian elements will be most benefited by a good roads system, the government has divided the country into districts with an appeal that the farm elements assist in the program.

The plan is to establish a network of highways connecting the more agricultural sections with the more densely populated towns and cities, thus affording an outlet for the products and probably reducing the cost of living for the ultimate consumer.

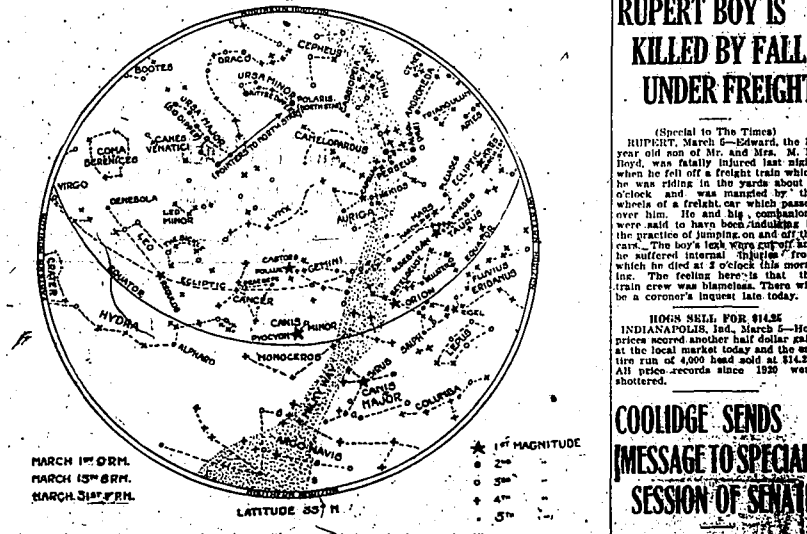
