The figures of the Chamber of Commerce showing that during the year 1924, \$7,527,285 worth of products, exclusive of seeds, were shipped from the Twin Falls depot, offers a convincing proof of the great resources of the Twin Falls tract. For there are other towns on this tract, Murtaugh, Hansen, Kimberly, Filer, Currie, Peavev and Buhl from which shipments of Twin Falls tract products are sent out. Then we have the Milner Lowlift tract, the Salmon tract and the Roseworth tract, with the Deep Creek irrigation and several small irrigation systems, and a lot of dry farmers that ship from other points. The bean market is now virtually closed and the results have been satisfactory both on the part of those who sold to buyers direct and those who sold through the association. There are still two payments due in the association. All the association beans have been sold except about 10 per cent and when these have been disposed of the final payments will be made. It is estimated that out of approximately 1,000 car loads of beans raised, not to exceed 80 cars are still tunsold.

Already there is a systematic campaign under way to run Coolidge for a third term. Mark Sullivan is giving it a push in "The World's Work"; cartoons indicating that by inference, are running regularly in many newspapers, and the tendency to whoop it up for "Cool Cal," which began the day after Harding passed away still continues. Whether Coolidge four years hence can overcome the third term tradition which proved insurmountable to two such noted characters as U.S. Grant and Theodore Roosevelt may be more than doubtful. So far his administration has not been successful legislatively. It is popular with his boosters to lay the blame on the insurgents. But many who were not insurgents, including our own congressmen, voted against him on leading issues. His record has been purely a negation and not a very effective negation at that. It is now up to him to adopt a progressive plan and earry it out. He is right as far as he goes on the world court proposition, and that is to his credit. There will be many opportunities in the ract four years for him to prove himself a great leader. Even that would not justify him in seeking a third term or the jeople in electing him again, but for the present that is hurdly a practical issue.

## PRICE OF SUGAR JUMPS IN TWIN FALLS

Few people perhaps give any very great heed to the price they are paying from day for sugar, but after-all that price is of more than passing interest-to-many of the farmers on this tract. Because the fluctuation of thet price either up or down has a great deal to do with the price paid for sugar beets. Just a few days ago the price of sugar went up ten cents, per sack; that does not mean very much to the average buyer because his or her sugarbill is not a very large part of their food cost for the year. But that raise of ten cents per sack in the price means that the farmer at the present price of sugar would get eight dollars and twenty-nine cents for his beets. This would mean that with the large acre yield which Twin Falls farmers get, that he would realize a handsome profit from his crop. from his crop.

There are many good crops which every farmer should plant on the Twin Falls tract and we are not advocating one particular crop, because we are strong for diversified crops, and we know that the farmer who plants a variety of crops usually has the largest bank account at the end of the year. Many farmers will plant beams, corn, potatoes, hay, etc., but we wish to urge that every farmer give some consideration to the planting of beets. If for no other reason let's try to grow beets enough on the south side of the Twin Falls tract to warrant the big sugar factory in running next fall. This large plant represents considerable capital and it means much to all of us to have the payroll which this factory produces every fall circulate throughout this county. You are sure of a pretty good market for your beets and you are sure of your cash when you sell them. Let's boost for the sugar beet industry and every other industry which will bring revenue to the farmer and business man alike.


