Utah Passes Law to Allow Mormon Classes in Public Schoolhouses

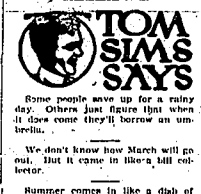
Kimberly Epworth League Play Well Presented to Crowd

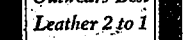

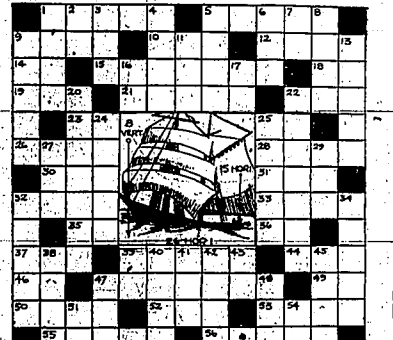
