MOORE SIGNS SCIENCE BILLS FOR BIG SUM

Over \$104,000 Appropriated in Bills Signed by Governor This Forenoon; One Bill Provides for Forest Fire Protection; Two Educational Bills Pass.

BOISE, Idaho, March 14.—Governor C. M. Moore Saturday morning signed appropriation bills carrying \$104,000, the first money measure to have approved since Tuesday. Two of the bills made provision for the state board of education. The executive approved them in full. Together with the appropriation bill, the appropriation bill, the increase of \$880 over that for the last biennium. The amount carried by the other two bills are: \$32,872.00 for deficiency claims for forest fire protection; \$50 for a relief claim of Elias Martens; \$400 for purchase of a piece of land and \$1300 for repair of road and building plant, all at the soldiers' home; \$8250 for increases in salaries in the state insurance fund school teachers. BOISE, March 14.—After Governor Moore vetoed the interurban bill last Tuesday he gave 45 hours to study of appropriation bills yet to be signed. He has taken action on any. He admitted that in order to keep the appropriation within the two-year budget, the governor would have to substitute for the three-eighths mill levy for school purposes, a two-eighths mill levy for the same purpose. The amount had been retired in the last two years, so he argued that the amount of the two-year budget would be less than before. He said that if the governor is to keep the total a quarter of a million dollars. WASHINGTON, D. C., March 14.—Eight million citizens will have filed their income tax returns by Monday night, according to estimates today. Payment must accompany each return—the whole amount of the tax if it exceeds the amount withheld from the interest on the last three-fourths, he may pay one-fourth, following the similar sum June 15, September 15 and December 15. 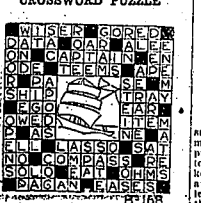

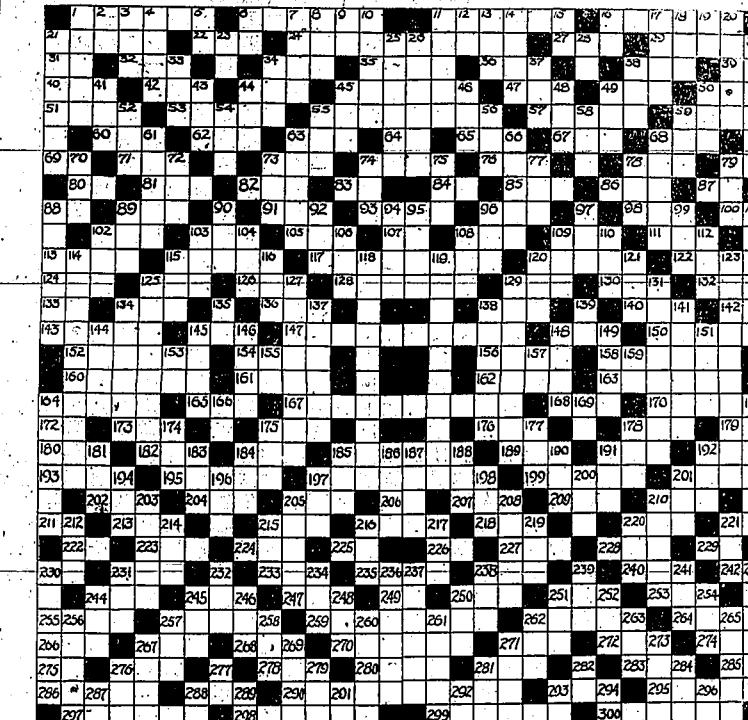

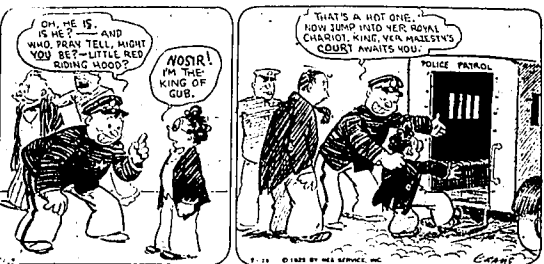
