GOOD THINGS TO EAT

Frictions may be served as an entree or as a dessert, depending upon the kind. A vegetable friction is always enjoyed. Mashed potatoes and vegetable systems are among the best. Pineapple Friction—Take one and one-half cups of flour, two cups of sugar, and one cup of crushed pineapple. Mix, yeast, and then spoonful of milk into deep tray. Cook until brown; drain on brown paper and serve with Richelieu Sauce—Dish one cup of sugar and one cup of water five minutes. Add a teaspoonful of cornstarch, moistened with a little water; cook until thick. Remove from the heat; add one-half cup of grated pineapple and a teaspoonful of maraschino liqueur. Mix well and add one tablespoonful of chopped maraschino cherries and serve.

Barbecued Lamb—Reheat slices of cold roast lamb—the following sauce: Two tablespoons of vinegar, one-half tablespoonful of jelly and one-half cup of water. Cook until the lamb is well-heated. Mutton Stew With Peas—Take a neck piece of mutton, cut into irregular pieces. When well-browned season with salt and pepper; dredge with flour. Simmer with water to cover, and one onion, until tender, then add a can of peas; thicken more if needed and serve the peas and gravy poured round the meat.

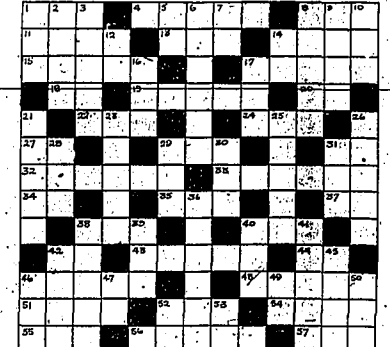

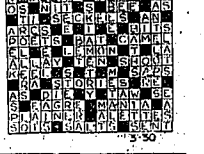
