SEASONABLE FOODS

This is the time of year when scrumptious tastes good on a cold morning for breakfast. This is another way of preparing it.



Scrap! Scrub four pigs feet and put them with two pounds of lard into a kettle and cover with boiling water; boil one-half hour on the stove, then put into the fireless cooker until night. Rubber again and return to stay overnight. In the morning cook to remove the fat, take the meat from the corn and chop. Strain the liquor with butter and add to the cooking. Add one meal and cook as usual. Stir in the chopped meat, season well with salt and pepper and pour into bread pan. When cold slice and fry.

Behemian Buns—Dissolve a compressed yeast cake in one-half cup of warm water, add to this one cup of scalded milk cooled, two well-beaten eggs, two tablespoons of butter, one teaspoon of salt. Mix well and add four cups of flour, kneading to a smooth elastic ball. Set to rise overnight. In the morning turn on a floured board, knead and roll to one-half inch thick; cut with a small biscuit cutter and place on a buttered sheet. 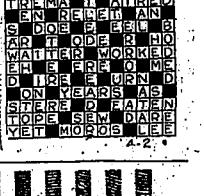

THE tonsils are little glands, normally about the size of small lily-of-the-valley buds. They lie in the mucous membrane in the back of the mouth, one on each side of the throat. They have little canals, called crypts, which secrete mucus to moisten the lining membrane of the mouth. When the tonsils are healthy, we never know they are there. Instead of forming an abscess, the infection may become chronic and the tonsils may then become permanently enlarged and so interfere with breathing. The constant absorption of poison from the infected and inflamed tonsils may cause rheumatism in the joints or muscles, fever or loss of appetite. The child is thin, pale, poor in nourishment and subject to frequent and continued colds. The poison may reach the heart, causing some form of heart disease, or may affect the kidney.

Long continued inflammation of the tonsils, either in the acute form or in the chronic but chronic form, destroys the structure of the tonsils and converts the glands into masses of sensitive tissue. They are then not only no use, but they are a real danger. The best thing to do is to get rid of them. Their removal is a simple matter of little danger or discomfort to the patient, if done by a competent physician.

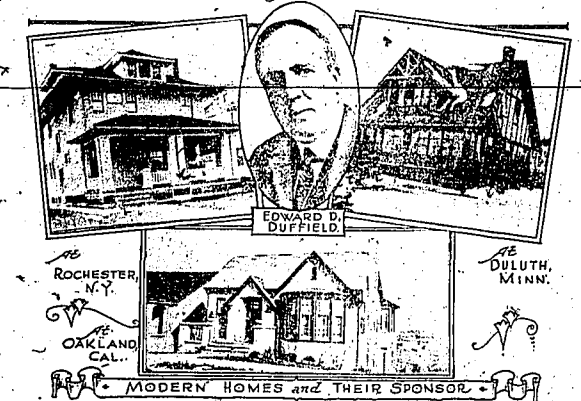

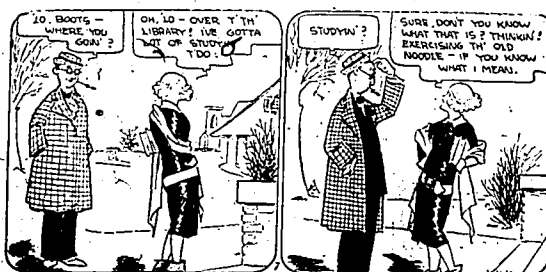
