## BURLEY MAN IS ROBBED BY TWO AUTO DRIVERS

Flinds to Help Men in Distress and Shows Himself Confident with Gun. Loves Silver but Saves Freebriars.

No report of the robbery of Joe Burley, a citizen of the Casita county line, above Burley, has been received at the office of Sheriff M. E. Finch today.

Auto men in distress nowadays seem to have a way of getting those who relieve them in bad. In some cases testimony indicates that they give \$20 worth of booze for 15 minutes help and in others they hold up the Good Samaritan, as they did with the Burley man, according to the following story from the Burley Herald:

"There shouldn't be any 'good' scales on an auto driver at a good jack when out on a lonely road, nor should such a nut be accused of driving a car without a fellow autoist in distress. The distress is very often a system of deceit to have a fellow stop so he can be held up. Joe Rowert of Burley was trapped in this way last Sunday morning about 2 o'clock east of Burley. Joe had been to Twin Falls and was on his way home when he noticed a man laying on the road with another man stopping over him. Joe stopped and got out of his truck to see what was the matter when one of the men allowed a gun to be face and yelled 'Hands up!'

The fellow who had been laying on the ground jumped up and struck Joe with a pocket-knife and jumped the money out and threw the purse on the ground and walked to his auto and drove on toward Burley.

The holdups secured about \$12.50 in silver from Joe and a pocket-knife in his another pocket.

The robbers were driving a Studebaker car with a license applied for on the windshield. They were both young men who made no attempt to get away. One of the men says he saw the cash they started toward Burley. They evidently turned off on Sunday night. Joe says he could not find any trace of the pair after they got out of sight.

## LINCOLN'S FUMIGATED BY BOARD

Slight Hives of Large Number of Pupils Friday Cause 'Comet' from Union of Huddling Possibility of Slight Attack of Flu is Considered.

Dr. J. P. Langehammer, consulting physician and health officer, this afternoon said he had spent considerable time investigating the cause of the wave of slight sickness which swept Lincoln school yesterday. He also examined last a dozen other physicians. All agreed that it was probably a slight attack of influenza affecting the stomach rather than the bronchial tubes, and that it spread rapidly. He said he had a number of cases with the inflammation or salivary condition of the throat.

Whereas the school, which affected 160 pupils in the Lincoln school was flu or due to some temporary condition within the school building, it has not been determined fully, it was stated today, but the entire school has been given thorough disinfection and will be allowed in air on Monday. Conditions first appeared in the Lincoln school on Friday, when some 16 children complained of slight sickness. The outbreak, however, was not unusual. Friday morning some time after the school opened, children began to complain and the matter was reported to Superintendent Ernest D. Bloom, who in turn notified Dr. J. P. Langehammer, county health officer.

To some extent the trouble spread by suggestion. Some children, who complained of high fever had, none, although the majority of them had headache had some temperature. Some who left in the morning, declaring they were sick, returned to the studies in the afternoon. Others who went out in the afternoon were back by Friday evening and were entirely well.

The suggestion that water might be had caused a chemical test to be made by City Chemist H. T. Walter, who found in the water nothing to indicate a peculiar circumstance was that none of the other buildings in the city had similar trouble.

## R. B. SMITH TELLS WHY HE FAVORS A QUIET CAMPAIGN

The people generally in Twin Falls prefer to the coming election as the most quiet election they have ever seen in Twin Falls, and the question naturally arises whether our city should be the way we elect our officers.

Immediately after my consent to become a candidate for councilman I have seen in Twin Falls, and the other candidates were in the field, the single statement that so far as was concerned, so far as my efforts would prevail, this campaign, if it could be called, was going to be the most quiet ever known in the history of Twin Falls and the one campaign to date entirely free from personal and factional differences and vituperations.

To my own knowledge since coming to Twin Falls, which was on April 12, 1908, our city, which we all feel could be made the finest city in any state, has been split apart and divided into factions by a bitter, factional, personal fight every two years. No

oneer would the breach be partially healed, and we all be ready to forget ahead again, than another election would come along, and the trouble started all over again. The result has been the situation that we have all seen, that is, instead of a united effort put forth by our citizens as a whole, we have had divided efforts, expended in futile attempts in different directions. That is, whatever because of the world famous Twin Falls Spirit of early days here.

My views are not shared by a majority of my friends, the argument advanced being that our citizens will not take the trouble to go to the polls and vote unless they are treated in advance to a red-hot, sensational, partisan or factional fight. Personally, I believe differently. I have noticed that the people of Twin Falls will exercise their right of franchise, go to the polls and cast their votes for the men of their choice.

The leading men of our nation have all expressed the views that it is the duty of every citizen to determine according to his own best judgment as to whom to vote for in a public election, and cast his ballot accordingly, a view with which you will all agree. If at the coming election a good, big, representative vote is cast, whether I win or lose, I will accept the verdict with a smile, and say, "Thank you" for there is anything of a national nature put forth, or any of the last minute propaganda, offered during the last hours before election,

you may rest assured it will not be done by myself nor any of the candidates with whom I am running, nor by anyone acting for us. If anything of that kind is done, it should all be regarded in its true light, and weighed accordingly.

Of far more importance than the direct result of this election so far as the candidates are concerned, is the attitude of the citizens of our city, Twin Falls, toward an election of this kind this one has been. Our city is a great one, and it is our duty to demand for so long a time, as evidenced by the business institutions that have their eyes on Twin Falls, some of whom have already located here, and the eyes of the country at large on Twin Falls again, as light were in this regard.

To show that our citizens are public spirited, and have an interest in our community affairs, in the biggest boost we can give our city. A large and representative vote at the polls next Tuesday will be the best evidence possible of that spirit and give Twin Falls the strongest kind of a shove in the right direction. It will show that the people here do not have to be coddled up with a vicious, personal, factional, red-hot fight in order to get out and vote at a city election; that we can take part in an election pertaining to the advancement of our city in a quiet, orderly, dignified, and impersonal manner.

Whether I am elected or not is to me a matter of secondary importance. Naturally, I feel I am qualified to fill the office of councilman, or I would not have accepted the nomination for re-election years. I feel I know something of the needs of our city. But if the people of Twin Falls will only vindicate my judgment, that they can get out and vote in as election as quiet as the one has been, to the same extent that they do in case where personal differences, factional rivalries, and mud-slinging and unfair tactics of all kinds have been the order of procedure, as you will recall has been the custom in the past, then I will feel that I have done my bit toward eliminating factional differences and disturbing elements that have hampered Twin Falls in its onward and upward effort the last several years, have helped some in the first step of our community toward acquiring that necessary spirit of cooperation, toward recognizing that old Twin Falls spirit, which you will have been so proud.
