THE INTERNATIONAL DANGER

BY JAMES D. WHELAN.

The facts set forth in the address of Rev. A. G. Pearson, paster of the First Presbyteman church of this city, on the occasion of the dedication of the D. A. R. memorial to soldier dead, relative to the terrific character of the next war, should there be one, are such as to arouse the desire of every good citizen to avert such a destructive event. Every condition described by Mr. Pearson exists and the possibilities which he mentioned are real and one might almost say probable.

On the other hand, it is possible that other factors which exist, may become the more potent, and that with universal good will and general international co-operation they may bring forth the fruits of permanent peace.

they may bring forth the fruits of permanent peace. Russia may go in any one of three ways. It may continue under modified bolishevism. In this case the Muscovite government in order to "make the world safe for sovietism" must make the world bolishevistic, either through aggression, or through boring from within. It may revert to ezarism, in which case the picture drawn by Rev. Mr. Pearson, of a renewal of the policy of Peter the Great, will be in full force and effect. There is another alternative, however, and that is that a regime based on the party of Kerénsky, will supplant both and co-operate in peaceful settlement. What will happen depends very much on how the other nations of the world, including the United States, act, not merely toward Russia, but toward one another. toward one another.

The principal danger spot seems the German frontier along the French border. Yet, in the Simonds article of last Sunday, there is a tone of optimism usually foreign to that rather pessimistic person. He says in effect that the triumph of Caillaux in France and the tendency of Germany toward sane liberalism, both indicate a desire to come to a reciprocal trade agreement and the removal of economic barriers so that the natural resources of each will be equally available to the producers of both. This would mean much. How far sensible adjustments go toward eliminating Diterness is ipdicated in South Africa. After the two Boer republies had been wiped out, the Dutch sottlers formed hate leagues, and children were pledged, as Hantibal was to flight the enemy, yet in the Great War, the leading Boer general commanded—the armies of England against the Germans in Africa. Why Because the liberal ministry, of England, which came in after the Boer war, acted sanely. It takes two to keep up hate.

We must do our part. We cannot keep out of a great foreign war. Washington and Adams tried it on the occasion of a great international struggle, but finally, under Adams got into what the supreme court called a limited war. We tried it under Jefferson and Madison, but finally got in. We tried it under Wilson, but could not keep out. Our only safety lies in doing our full part to bring about international understanding.
