## STATE POLICE MAY BE ASKED TO STOP RIOTS

**Tipples Burned at West Virginia Coal Mines; and Great Parade of Strikers; \$200,000 Damage Done and Another Mine Dynamited.**

**MORGANTOWN, W. Va., April 28.—**State police were held in readiness today to quell any disturbances in the strike areas of northern West Virginia resulting from the burning of three mine tipples near here, dynamiting or a mine in Granton, and an automobile parade of 500 men and striking miners June 1st at Fairmont. Three mine tipples of the Gilbert Drug Coal Company were burned last night with a loss estimated at \$200,000. Following the fire was an incendiary origin, 15 state policemen were assigned to investigate.

The Sand Lick Mine of the Great Northern Coal Company, near Grafton, which was to begin today on an open shop basis after being closed for two days, was dynamited last night. Damage was limited to the machinery and layed opening of the workings.

Accompanied by a band, 50 miners in automobiles paraded to the coal company's plant of the Great Northern Coal Company early today where they staged a demonstration.

The parading miners made no threats, but sang and listened to the speakers.

## Presidential Publicity Is Issue at Washington

**Newspapermen Want Direct Statements at White House Interviews in Place of Existing System Which Prohibits President From Being Quoted Directly; Interpretation of Coolidge's Remarks Vary.**

**WASHINGTON, D. C., April 28.—**Irreconcilable report on the president's method by which he gives direct authoritative statements to the press, newspapermen may only keep for the president and do not help the newspaper man, for which the greater number of them are to the public through White House correspondents.

The present method, if the plan is adopted, will wipe off the record that the president is not to be quoted. The president's views on politics, writing, and reading will be reduced to writing, and more available for direct quotation, and "periodicals" as the official statements of the views of the chief executive, on public questions.

The present method by which the chief executive keeps in touch with the newspaper men is unsatisfactory, for it causes the criticism of the critics—most of whom in his White House office. They write out questions to him, and he answers them before admitted to his room, and gives him that time to prepare his answer.



The president stands behind his blank. He picks up his pen and says: "The president believes" and that. "The president does not believe" and that. He has to answer a dozen queries and answer another one. ## TWIN FALLS COUNTY MAN GETS NEW TRIAL

**Harry J. Dunlap Convicted in Dist. Court Here of Manslaughter is Granted New Trial by Idaho Supreme Court**

That where the securing of firearms is introduced as an incriminating circumstance in a criminal case, the state, in order that the defense has a right to introduce the testimony of others than defendant to show the conventional character of the offense, or the borrowing of the weapon, in order to prove innocent intent, is the substance of one of the rulings of the state against Harry J. Dunlap, of Boise, for the killing of C. A. Russell, a brother-in-law, as received today by Bothwell & Chapman, who represented the defendant. Other points of contention, to which Dunlap appealed are also shown.

Dunlap borrowed a shot gun from his brother, Dell. Dell was allowed to explain that he borrowed the gun to shoot magpies, but Dell was not permitted to fully explain his conversation with the officer in connection with the borrowing of the gun.

**Man Points Discreased.**

**BOISE, Idaho—Harry J. Dunlap of Twin Falls county** was granted a new trial by a supreme court decision here down-  
loading in which the conviction of murder in the second degree, was reversed.

Dunlap was convicted of murder by a Russell, his neighbor, on the morning of April 30, 1922, following an alteration over damages to property Russell was to Dunlap's property, Dunlap, who had been shot, which Dunlap was holding, words followed and Russell, reaching for an axe, threatened the lives of Dunlap and his wife. Dunlap ran to a nearby grain elevator, in which there was a shotgun. He reached for it and pointed it at Russell. It went off, the load striking him in the shoulder. He died the next day.

The supreme court held that the lower court erred in the giving of several instructions to the jury, one of which involved the law of self defense. In one of these the trial judge used the words in referring to Dunlap's actions, under Russell's threat, of ordinary firmness and courage.

**Jury Was Misled.**

The supreme court holds that the jury was misled in its verdict because they were led to believe that it was synonymous with the requirements of the law of self defense which requires that a man act as a reasonable and prudent man would likely to act under similar conditions and circumstances, when it is not, says the Statesman.

The court also instructed the jury that:

"Malice includes not only anger, hatred and revenge, but every unlawful and unmerciful malice."

In ruling against this instruction the court says:

The giving of an instruction containing the above language has been discontinued, the court says, it tends to lead the jury to believe that they would be justified in finding that an act was done with malice
