## DOUGLAS IS ELECTED TO THE COUNCIL

Run-off Election with Good Vote Shows Majority of 108 to Min Who Commended His Political Campaign Was Good Natured.

By a total vote of 747 for Thomas J. Douglas to 651 for S. S. Allen, the former was elected by the Twin Falls voters in the run-off election yesterday. Douglas had a majority of 106. The first ward vote stood 324 for Douglas and 251 for S. S. Allen, the second ward Douglas 256 and Allen 230.

All total vote of 1298 was considered soon for a run-off as the total vote of the first election was only 1772. It was less than half the total vote of two years ago, when an exciting, and bitter campaign was conducted, although the city population has increased a second time in the past two years.

At the first election Douglas received 845 votes and Allen 803, neither having a clear majority. The new administration which will consist of E. Ashton, mayor; Ralph W. Smith and T. J. Douglas, councilmen; according to Dr. J. H. Dwight and Mr. All, and J. S. Keel and W. T. Leslie, hold-over commissioners.
