# NAVY PLANE BREAKS NON- STOP WORLD RECORD TODAY

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., May 2.—Almost doubling the previous world's record for non-stop flight, the naval all-metal seaplane PN-9 glided to the surface of the Delaware river at 2:57 o'clock daylight saving time this afternoon, completing 28 hours and 35 minutes, 27 seconds of continuous flying.

**CORVALLIS**—The May 4 dusting of orchards by airplane has been instead of spraying them may become a permanent feature of the state's experiments conducted near here by the United States bureau of agriculture and the Oregon State Department of Agriculture.

In the most extensive trials yet performed in the state, 100 pounds of sixty acres of a huge apple orchard near Monroe were dusted with an insecticide. The dusting was done by a plane designed to eliminate scale and codling moth.

In charge of the experiment was Lieutenant Gailley G. Kulley, head of the state's insect control division. One of the aviators of trans-continental flight harnessed the dusting machine to a biplane. The plane was not power attached to the side of the airplane. Its capacity was 100 pounds of insecticide. The plane was flown at 1,000 feet and the dusting machine released this over the entire length of the orchard.

Lieutenant Kulley was complimented by horticulturists working on the orchard for the way he handled the plane. It was necessary for the machine to be driven at terrific speed and the crew to achieve the best result.

The approximate distance traveled was 142½ miles. The plane, piloted by Lieut. J. B. Kyle and C. H. Seifrieder, took off from the navy camp here at 10:02 a. m. Friday and all day and last night cruised at an average speed of 66 knots over the river, before Fort Delaware, below Wilmington and the navy yards here. For the last hour of the night the P.N.9 circled closely around the air base at the navy yards, to minimize landing difficulties when the last drop-of-fuel was exhausted.

Four State Records and Seven District Records Are Broken at Filer Track Meet; Alvord Leads Field for Number of Points, and Timm Follows; Close Second; Twin Falls Wins Relay by Big Margin.

Four state records and several district records were broken yesterday at the Filer track meet by teams of southern Idaho. Some of the fastest time that has been recorded for high schools was made yesterday afternoon, and if these star track men are in good condition they should break several records in state meets here held in Postville.

The star of yesterday's meet was Captain Alvord of the Twin Falls track team, who scored a total of 22½ points. Alvord won four races, one third and took part in the 440 yard relay team. Timm started the record smashing pace when the 440 yard relay team of the 220 yard race and made the distance in 21½ seconds. Timm was second high man in the meet with a total of 20½ points. Smith of Jerome came third in points with 11 to his credit. Smith threw the javelin 168 feet and eight inches and tossed his own record for the district in this event. Hager of Rupert broke the state record for the discus throw by hurling it 117 feet and 10 inches. This is 10 feet further than the old state record.

**Gooding Boy Is Surprise.**—The surprise of the meet was the surprise of the early predictions as to who would win most of the races. Gooding, a boy of 15, won the 100 yard race and in the 50 yard race was close to Alvord. In crowd, Timm was the star of the meet, and for a time it was thought this race was a tie.
