RADIO CHATS WITH Powel Crosley Jr.

The word "radio" comes from "radiate" meaning to give off something such as energy in every direction.

The broadcasting station may be likened to a pebble dropped into a pool of water, the radio waves spread to the water waves made by the pebble, and the receiving set likened to coils scattered about on the pool, bobbing up and down as the waves strike them.

It is true that the waves are not actually illustrated by a fact well known to song men. When companies of soldiers are marching across a bridge they are always made to break step, for if they march in unison the bridge is quite likely to swing up and down until the strain becomes too great and it collapses.

If you ever have used an swing you know that if you keep giving it pushes at the right intervals it will keep swinging higher and higher. If you push it at the wrong times, however, the result will be entirely different and will act like a sailor just ashore, with "swells," careening this way one moment and that way the next. This is because the swing has a tendency to move back and forth at a certain fixed rate—the rate depending on the manner in which it is constructed—and pushing it out of time will give it an irregular motion. The time required for one complete swing, or cycle, back and forth is called the period, and the object tends naturally to respond to called its natural period.

As for soldiers keeping step when marching over a bridge, they should happen to be marching at just the right tempo, the bridge would swing up and down a little farther each time until finally the strain would be too great. This is called the principle of resonance.

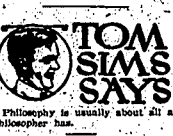

WHY FARMING DECLINED

A review of the present status of agriculture in New England has shown that the most important causes of its decline are: (1) the conditions which exist are: Waste of farm resources; failure to understand and practice the fundamental principles of business; lack of an adequate program of farm management and soil management; with the attendant depletion of soil fertility; choice of unsuitable and oftentimes unmarketable varieties; the use of poor seed; the knowledge and breeding of inferior and male; the use of purchased feeds instead of home-grown grain; quantity instead of quality production; and failure to grade produce properly and according to law. The decline of New England agriculture presents a serious problem, which deserves the most careful study.—Banker-Farmer.
