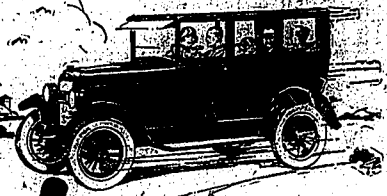

ATHLETICS ARE WORKING FOR THE PENNANT

Eastern Teams Are Coping All the Early Games and Outside of Chicago White Sox Taking One from Senators Everything Is Going to the East; Pirates Showing Up Strong.

BY HENRY L. FARRELL. NEW YORK, May 9.—One game does not give accurate estimate of a baseball team's strength. Otherwise, the preponderance of strength in the major leagues could be said to be in the East after the first interlocking skirmishes of the season.

Seven of the eight games were won by Eastern teams and the Chicago White Sox in downing the champion Washington Senators were the only western outfit to take a game.

The Philadelphia Athletics bumped the Cleveland Indians and went into first place in the American league, by a distance of the White Sox, who dropped down from six to five.

The New York Giants pulled a game out of the fire with a ninth inning rally that redeemed the 'St. Louis Cardinals.

The Cincinnati Reds got off on the wrong foot and lost to the tribine but there is nothing serious in that. The Reds have a very good ball club and when Jack Hopkins, their ace pitcher, is in the field he will have a real dangerous contender. The team has been weakened all season by injuries.

It begins to look now as if there is something serious wrong with the Pittsburgh Pirates. No ordinary slump could account for a team that has lost six of its last seven games.

Notice is hereby given that the Mayor and Council of the City of Twin Falls, Idaho, will receive and consider sealed bids and proposals on the 11th day of May, 1922, at the hour of 8 o'clock P. M. of said day, at the Council Chambers in the office of the City Clerk of said city, in the Waters Clinic Building, at the corner of Second Avenue North and Second Street North in said city, for doing work and furnishing the material for improving certain parts of streets within the city of Twin Falls, Idaho, by gravelling the same, as hereinafter described and set forth in Ordinance No. 293 and 397, which ordinances respectively describe and set forth the boundaries and limits of Local Improvement District No. 46 of the City of Twin Falls, Idaho. Said ordinance are on file in the office of the City Clerk of said city at the location above ascertained, at which place access to the same can be obtained.

Plans and specifications for said proposed improvements are filed in the office of the City Clerk of said city and can be referred to in the office of the City Clerk of said city, at the corner of Second Avenue North and Second Street North in said city, and may be referred to and examined by any bidder of bidders.

The general character of said improvements shall be grading and gravelling the roadway of said street and in the manner as set out in the specifications and estimate of the City Engineer, to-wit, specifications and estimate of gravelling Fourth Avenue North from Third Street North to Sixth Street North, and the same preparing of the base shall be done by the city and at its expense. The contractor shall furnish and haul and spread the gravel as directed by the city. The total amount of gravel required will be approximately 200 cubic yards, which is to be spread to a depth of 3 inches, over a width of 36 feet and length of approximately 1400 feet. No material which will not pass through a mesh screen shall be permitted. The total estimated cost of furnishing, hauling and spreading the gravel shall not exceed the sum of \$1850.00. Work upon said improvements shall be commenced on the date specified and shall be completed on the date specified at such times as the Mayor and Council shall designate. Each bid and proposal must be accompanied by certified check upon some reliable bank, payable to the City of Twin Falls or order, in an

amount equal to 10% of the amount of the entire contract. In the event that the successful bidder does not enter into a contract with the said City of Twin Falls for the making of said improvements, the said check will be retained by the city and the said bidder shall forfeit the same to the City of Twin Falls. The checks of unsuccessful bidders will be returned to them at the time of the rejection of their bids and proposals.

The person, firm, or corporation obtaining the contract for the construction of said improvements will be required to furnish the said city, 30 days before the time of the delivery of the contract, with a good and sufficient bond in some reliable Surety Company, in an amount equal to 60% of the entire amount of the contract price, conditioned for the faithful performance of all conditions of the contract by him or it to be performed, and conditioned further for the faithful performance of the terms and provisions of the Statutes of the State of Idaho in such cases made and provided.
