RUM RUNNERS BREAK THROUGH U.S. BLOCKADE

Out of a Total of 42 Rum Ships Which Hovered Off the Port a Week Ago Only 13 Remain; Blockade Broken on Pacific Coast; Base Shifted.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 12.—Rum runners have broken the "dry blockade" of the Pacific coast, according to prohibition authorities here today. Five thousand cases of liquor have been landed within a week at Point and Monterey south here, it was said, with a consequent drop of rum prices.

Reports from southern California to government officials admit that the coastwise rum runners have broken through the blockade. The "Yankee" have been driven by faster smuggling ships around the Santa Barbara straits and are now operating about fifty of the ten fast patrol boats will be used to aid the "Tanner" and "Yankee".

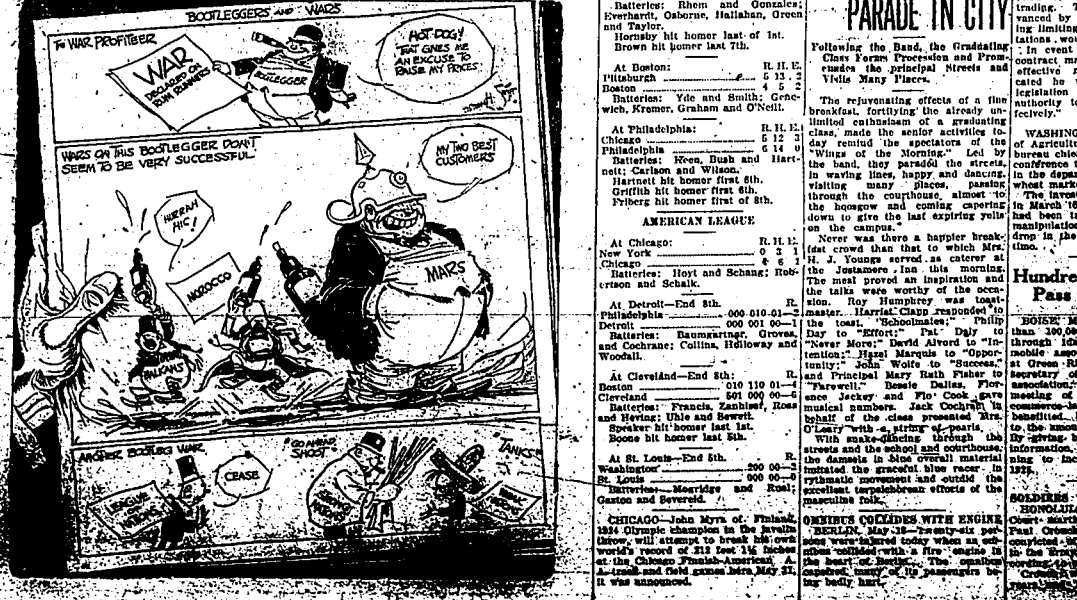

Iron-bearing plants. Experimenters have been under way to increase the quantity of iron carried in certain plants, with a view to the effect on the human system, when these plants are used as food. Artificially prepared foods containing iron do not always produce the desired effect because the iron is not completely assimilated. This difficulty, it is thought, may be avoided by causing plants to take up an increased quantity of iron during their natural growth. By adding hydrate of iron to the soil in which it was growing, the experimenters have, it is reported, succeeded in producing spinach containing a percentage of iron seven times as great as that found in ordinary spinach. It is believed that the process will prove successful with other ferruginous plants.

AMERICAN FALLS SHOULD BE BUILT TO CAPACITY

Here is a bit of information which ought to be carefully read by the citizens of southeastern Idaho. It concerns the people via the American Falls dam. The real estate board of this city has handed to its members the following statement which is of supreme interest to every citizen.

"If the maximum dam is built at American Falls, engineers estimate that the cost to farmers will be five dollars per acre inbed of corn, the cost of the dam as now being constructed; but in addition, unless the maximum dam is built, 50,000 acres of the best land in the whole area all within 12 miles of Pocatello will remain in sage brush. If converted to tillable land under water, this area will produce at least 1,250,000 bushels of wheat on a basis of 25 bushels per acre. That means, at least, one and a quarter million dollars of annual new wealth within 12 miles of Pocatello every year repeated, or over a period of ten years, a total of 12 and a half million dollars. But it will be more than that for such of this land will be utilized as dairy farms where milk and butter and cheese will be produced. Moral: We need that MAXIMUM dam. Let's get it.—Idaho State Journal.

It is hard to be deprived of our cherished traditions. So many have gone that there is little confidence to be placed in anything. It would naturally be supposed that the wireless, the radio and the flying machine would have made people more credulous. Instead it has made us more critical. Not content with taking away our belief in the horse hair turning into a worm when placed in water we are now told that fish worms are not raised down but come up out of the ground. Far be it from us to dispute science but every boy ten years of age can testify that after every big rain the ground is covered with wiggling worms.

The government is establishing a blockade to catch ruff runners and the higher ups are making a great roar. If prohibition is to be enforced favorites cannot be played. The government must not know individuals in law violation. The fight must be against the entire system. The trouble with law enforcement has been that so many officials have felt that they had to wink at violations in the so-called upper set. That has not only discredited the law but it has embittered some of the friends of the hunted. Given a square deal and no one can complain but playing favorites makes anarchists.

The international holiday of Working Women in Russia was observed here recently. The day was marked by the opening of a number of nurseries, co-operative laundries and restaurants, and other institutions designed to lighten the work of women. At the same time a campaign was launched to combat and alleviate unemployment among women, which is already beginning to have serious social consequences. A law is proposed which would forbid the dismissal of mothers of young children and unmarried women from their positions without the previous consent of the Bureau of Labor Inspection. Vocational courses are to be instituted for the benefit of women who are already unemployed.—The Monitor.

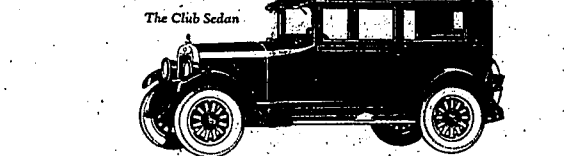
