"ACRES OF DIAMONDS," DELIVERED TO THE TWIN FALLS COMMUNITY BANQUET

(Address by Ralph Edmunds)

The following is the text of the eloquent address on "Acres of Diamonds," delivered before the banquet of the Twin Falls Realtors to the visitors from Coconote, Castleford, Buhl, and Jerome at the Rogerson hotel last evening.

In reproducing this address in our editorial columns we do so with no suggestion of endorsing its contents but merely present the subject matter without comment, for what it is worth.

To possess wealth is the desire and ambition of every man. Were I able to tell the location of a great store of hidden treasure most of the citizens of Idaho would journey to that place in order to discover the wealth that we all would like to possess. We remember the rush to the gold fields of the Klondike. If you possessed a gold mine you would consider yourself fortunate indeed. To own a diamond mine you would satisfy our wildest dreams of wealth. We are all disposed to visualize these mines of wealth as being far away, just over the hill, in some other land than ours. The bag of gold at the end of the rainbow seems to most of us to be just over the horizon in some other country than where we live. You of Twin Falls are living over a gold mine. All about you are diamond mines—acres and acres of diamonds.

When God made the world he favored some lands more than He favored other lands. To some He gave a soil of great fertility, to others were given stubborn soils of little fertility. In the great scheme of things a special blessing was bestowed upon the people who now, and who hereafter, will inhabit the fertile plains of the great Snake River. Ages ago great volcanoes poured out their molten flow over this great field. Then for years these same craters poured out billions and billions of tons of ashes that settled from the air down upon this field. These ashes were nothing more nor less than lava rock burned to small cinders. After countless centuries this lava ash had decomposed and this made our soil that is known as volcanic ash. This formation covers all of southern Idaho from a depth of from three to thirty feet.

There are certain mineral contents that are essential to soils in order that upon them may be grown the things upon which men and animals subsist. A chemical analysis of the soil is necessary to determine this point. Connected with the great University of Pennsylvania is the greatest soil expert in America. He traveled all over the known world and analyzed all of the soils of the earth's surface. Upon his return he delivered an address before the student body of the college and this is what he said: "After making a study and careful analysis of all of the soils of the earth, I find that the richest valley in the world is a very small valley in Italy. I further find that the richest large valley (and the richest valley on earth with the above exception) is the valley of the Snake River in Southern Idaho. I find that the mineral content of their soil and water is five times that of the soil and water of the Mississippi valley. It is richer than the Nile. The agricultural possibilities of the Snake River valley have not been touched upon as yet."

A man from Wisconsin after traveling over all of the United States made the statement recently in Madison that if the farmers of the United States knew of the great fertility of the farming lands of the Snake River valley that every farm in America would be for sale, except the farms in Idaho, and that there would be such a rush of farmers to Idaho within five years that the State could not absorb them.

That is why Idaho produced the greatest cow that ever lived on this earth. She was the champion of all champions of all time, and she was born and raised in the Boise valley, Idaho. It was the mineral content of the soil that produced the forage that built up her great body with its capacity for milk production. That is why Mr. Kraft says that Idaho will be the greatest dairy state in the Union within ten years. The forage and water that sustained that cow contained the right mineral content for the building of bone and sinew in an animal. We can import a cow from Wisconsin and her calf when grown will weigh three hundred pounds more than its mother. Mineral content is what performed this miracle.

Our lambs top every market. Our potatoes sell in the east for three times as much as do the potatoes from any other state in the Union. Idaho potatoes are the most popular vegetable in America today and when that vegetable is properly exploited we will not be able to supply the demand if we plant every acre of the state to potatoes. Our canned corn is the best on any market. Our celery has no competition. Our poultry has a better flavor than has any other poultry. That is why Swift is coming into

our state with his great plants to care for our poultry products. And so it is with everything that we produce from this soil—it outclasses the products of any other land. Why is this true? It is because of the mineral content that God put into this soil, and that is why we say that this is the richest valley on earth. It is not a guess, it is not propaganda. It is a scientific fact that any man can verify if he cares to go to the trouble of analyzing our soil and water. It is the only large tract of land on earth that will never lose its fertility. When such crops as potatoes and grain take from the soil certain mineral content we can plant the ground to alfalfa and clover and these plants will absorb from the air and water above the earth these missing minerals and put them back into the soil and its original fertility is restored. Not a pound of artificial fertilizer was ever used in Idaho. The oldest farms are the best producers. A similar volcanic ash soil has been formed in Asia for three thousand years and it is still producing as much as it ever did. This rich soil in Idaho will be producing bountiful crops three thousand years from now.

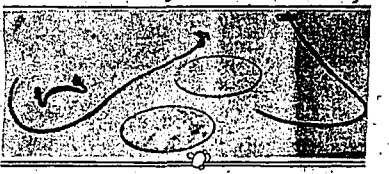

It wasn't that he did anything to win their kindly regard. They simply gave it to him unasked. Even when he closed them up, they spoke well of him afterwards. He didn't like crime, he said, but he considered a reasonable amount of vice. Within bounds, he explained, though reprehensible, he considered it the virtuous individual's own affair.

PROBABLY this attitude was what endeared him to the liberal element. It didn't condemn him to puritanism, however, and one term as mayor will all he got out of three consecutive terms. He, before the liberal-minded part of the citizenry had found out what kind of character they subsequently thought he was. His humor was too subtle for much success in politics.

As I say, I knew him very well. I think this is the sort of people they had like, and I'm sorry the world never will see his memoirs.

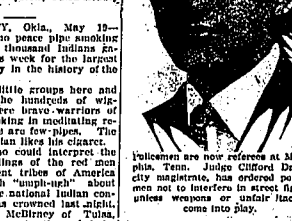
